

**CAMDEN WILL SHINE IN BRIDGE PARADE**

Floats and Brass Bands in Demonstration to Mark Beginning of Construction

**BUS OWNERS IN COUNCIL**

That Camden will make a good showing in the big parade and demonstration a week from today to mark the starting of the physical work on the great Delaware River Bridge was the assurance given members of Camden City Council at its meeting last night.

Chairman of the Public Welfare Committee of City Council, Mr. Von Nida, stated that the city will have two appropriate floats and two brass bands in line. He said James H. Long, city water chief, would be marshal of the Camden delegation.

Assurance was given by Mr. Von Nida that there would be six additional floats in the parade. Members of Council were invited to take part in the demonstration, and a representative member of the body promised Mr. Von Nida that he would participate in the parade.

The Camden parade will form at Delaware street and Federal street, move out Federal street to Madison street, then to Newton street to Broadway, up Broadway to Market street to the Pennsylvania ferry.

Clearer co-operation between operators of automobiles and jitneys in Camden and City Council was urged by Horace H. Brewer, bus operator, of Williams town, who joined in a protest against the passage of an ordinance designed to designate routes and schedules of cars running in and through Camden.

Mr. Brewer said the "avenue" bus operators in Camden were aiming to eliminate the element that persists in speeding and racing trolley cars and generally disobeying all regulations pertaining to traffic. Mr. Brewer said the bus operators are ready to co-operate with City Council, Traffic Committee and police department.

Representing the jitney operators running on Ketchikan avenue, Jacob Furer protested against the passage of the ordinance requiring printed signs showing route and schedule to be placed on the cars. The ordinance was referred to the Traffic Committee for reconsideration.

City Council also passed the annual budget and the ordinance providing for the establishment of a Bureau of Charities.

Councilmen Sherwood, of the Tenth Ward; Jones, of the Sixth; Trebar, of the Thirteenth, and Epping, of the Fourteenth, who retire as members of City Council, made their farewell speeches.

**LAST MAN'S CLUB TO DINE**

10 of 12 Original Members Still Alive—Three Served in War

The Last Man's Club, a unique organization, will have its eighth annual dinner tomorrow night in Mosebach's Cafe, Thirteenth street and Girard avenue. In 1913 the club was formed with a limited membership of twelve members. Ten are still alive. Three served in the World War and returned unscathed. At its first meeting phonograph records were made bearing a message from each member to the one of them who lives longest. Three, along with other gifts to the last man, are in a vault of the West Philadelphia Title and Trust Company.

Rumors that bottles of a rare vintage are included in the gifts are denied. The club members have been affiliated with the Third Baptist Church since childhood. One of the best known members is Dr. Clarence H. Chain, now the churchman and former president of the Christian Endeavor Society in this State.
