NET CROOKS \$2000

Dr. Cyrus Adler Is Robbed of \$300 Fur Coat at Offices of Jewish Relief

HOTEL GUEST IS VICTIM
Activities of thieves over the week-end netted them jewelry and clothing valued at approximately \$2000.

In addition, a barrel of alcohol, inestimable in value to bootleggers, was stolen from the wholesale drug warehouse of Nick Pelosi, Twelfth and Dickinson streets.

Dr. Cyrus Adler, president of Dropsie College, had his \$300 fur overcoat taken from the headquarters of the Jewish War Relief, at 1512 Walnut street. He was working in one of the front offices.

Helen O'Donnell, 2007 North Sixteenth street, was held up by three Negroes last night near her home as she was returning from church. They took \$1 and her bag.

An eighteen-year-old girl who rented a room from Mrs. Mary McLaughlin, 2031 Spring Garden street, and gave an undoubtedly fictitious name, is believed to be responsible for disappearance of jewelry and clothing valued at \$150.

Slovak thieves stole a fur coat valued at \$200 from the store of Herman Goodman, at 422 South street.

TRIES TO SHIELD SON

Father, Accidentally Shot, Says He Held Gun
Solomon Slutsky, 914 North Second street, persisted in telling police he shot himself accidentally yesterday, although two sons said the shooting happened while the elder was examining a revolver.

The bullet entered his liver. It is believed he will recover. At St. Mary's Hospital, when police investigated his story, he attempted to shield his son Samuel. Later this boy was arrested when he told the real story of the shooting, and it was corroborated by his brother Benjamin.

It seems Samuel feared their home might be robbed. There had been a number of robberies in the neighborhood, while he was examining a revolver he purchased, it was discharged and the bullet struck his father sitting at a window.

BEATS WAY FROM COAST

Rides on Fastest Trains—Here in Four Days
Stealing rides on the fastest trains, Michael Melillo, nineteen, arrived in Philadelphia this morning after four days out of San Francisco. Melillo, hiding in the front end of train 202 on the Pennsylvania Railroad, was turned over to Special Officer Hinkelhart by a woman.

Dressed in a blue denim suit, which gave indication of having been worn in a correctional institution, he appeared before Magistrate Dorn. Twenty-second and Hunting Park avenue, and said he was on his way to New York, where he hoped to find work. Magistrate Dorn sent him to the House of Correction for three months.

TRIES SUICIDE BY GAS

Unable to Bring Wife From Russia, Man Attempts Own Life
Unable to bring his wife to this country because of the Bolshevik blockade, Anton Spunkins, thirty-seven years old, of Eighth street near Fairmount avenue, attempted suicide yesterday in the third floor of his home by inhaling hydrogen gas.

He was found by occupants of the house, who smelled the gas. At the Roosevelt Hospital, it is said that his condition is critical. Spunkins, according to the police, has been suffering for some time to bring his wife here from Russia, and when he learned it was impossible for a time he became despondent.
