By GEORGE NON MCCAIN Harrisburg, Pa., Jan. 13.—A new and sensational phase of the complex affairs of the Auditor General's office while under the charge of Charles A. Snyder, present State Treasurer and candidate for Governor, has just developed.

Important papers are missing from the records of that office.

Mr. Snyder, it will be recalled, has repeatedly proclaimed, "I am the boss," when questioned about the employment of attorneys over the State with big fees without the knowledge or consent of the Attorney General.

This action, as I pointed out in previous dispatches, is in direct defiance of the law of 1915. This law directs that all attorneys for any department of the State Government must be employed with the knowledge, consent and advice of the Attorney General.

He is also to be consulted about the amount of fees to be paid in such cases.

Auditor General Snyder persistently and defiantly violated this law during his term of office as Auditor General.

The enormous fees paid by him, exceeding, by his own statements, the sum of \$100,000, can be recovered by action against his estates.

Among those who benefited largely by the financial favor of Mr. Snyder was John H. Fertig, of Schuylkill County, attorney at law. Schuylkill is Mr. Snyder's home county, and until recently he has been the Republican county leader there.

In previous articles I have noted the fact that Mr. Fertig was one of Mr. Snyder's principal lieutenants in Schuylkill County. He was, I am informed, associated with the Auditor General formerly in the practice of law.

\$10,000 for "Extra Services"

Mr. Fertig is assistant director of the Legislative Reference Bureau, at a salary of \$8000 a year. In addition to this salary, he received \$10,000 in two years from Mr. Snyder for "extra legal services."

The character of these extra legal services is not set forth in the vouchers filed in the records left by Auditor General Snyder. They have never been disclosed.

It was a case in which the expert accountants, Main & Co., were employed, for lack of information, promptly to record them as "extra legal services," as all details were lacking.
