

GREETED WITH JOY

Freeing of "War" Prisoners Is Most-Welcomed Development in Situation

COLLINS GOING TO LONDON

By the Associated Press Dublin, Jan. 13 .- Materialization of the amnesty of political prisoners in Ireland has elicited more outward enthusiasm here than any other develop-

ment in the peace activities. It may be remarked in passing that the choice of the phrase "act of oblivion" rather than an "act of elemency" in the announcement is recognized as a happy diplomatic stroke.

Dublin's citizens indulged in lively demonstrations last night, a large crowd outside Mountjoy prison welcoming the successive batches of liberated prisoners with loud cheers, while a happy atmosphere generally pervaded the streets. Similar scenes were enacted in Cork and Limerick, where others were released.

Arrive From England

It is understood that a number of men freed from prisons in England will arrive today, when further demonstra-tions are certain. Popular demands regarding the prisoners, however, will not be wholly setisfied until the amesty is extended to those arrested in England for illegal acts there. An edi-torial in today's Irish Independent is typical of this feeling. It says:
"Handreds of Irishmen have been sent to prison for political activities in England—activities which resulted from the last day of the pageant.
