

COME BRILLIANTLY MEETS AMERICANS Composite Troops From Coblenz Arrive to Honor Italy's Unknown Hero TO GIVE CONGRESS MEDAL

By the Associated Press Rome, Jan. 17.—Rome outdid itself today in extending a welcome to the American troops who came here to participate in tomorrow's ceremonies attending the bestowal of the Congressional Medal of Honor upon Italy's Unknown Soldier. The American composite company from Coblenz, under Major General Harry T. Allen, was greeted on its arrival by the strains of the "Star Spangled Banner" from the band of the Royal Carabinieri in their brilliant uniforms; by a picked company of the 3rd Cavalry as the guard of honor; by scores of generals wearing rows of glittering medals; by squadrons of cavalry with their gay plumes; by a brigade of infantry lining the adjacent square and by cheering throngs of the people. The display was the most spectacular Rome has seen since the days before the war. Brand-new uniforms were worn by the troops on parade, with touches of color everywhere, and the shining silver helmets and the glittering awards, lances and bayonets combined to complete a brilliant spectacle at the railway station. The station was bedecked with the Stars and Stripes and the Italian tricolor. General Allen was met at the station by Richard Washburn Child, the American Ambassador, and General Diaz, who recently returned from America. King Victor Emmanuel was represented by an aide, Colonel Maurizio Della Rocca, and Admiral Maiz. General Allen was conducted to the royal palace, where he was received by Ministers of War Gasparotto and Lieutenant General Vacari, head of the General Staff, and then was presented to the various generals and other officers in attendance. General Allen received the award of honor and complimented the commander on the smart appearance of his grandees. After the formalities General Allen was driven to his hotel through lines of troops, while the American infantrymen marched away through double lines of Italian soldiers along the avenues to their barracks. The royal Italian bands and mounted carabinieri escorted the Americans amid frequent hearty cheers and shouts of "Viva America" from the thickly packed crowds.
