

STEEL MEN DEMAND CUT IN RAIL RATES

High Freight Impeding Business Revival, Manufacturers Tell Interstate Commissioners

ASK 40 PER CENT DECREASE

By the Associated Press Washington, Jan. 23.—Representatives of the steel industry, appearing today before the Interstate Commerce Commission in connection with the investigation into transportation rates, renewed their demand that the 40 per cent increase in freight rates ordered in 1920 be removed.

"It is the maladjustment of prices and services which continues to force the existing depression," D. L. Roney, of Middletown, O., declared, speaking for the American Rolling Mills Company.

WILL TAKE CHANCES ON SERVICE

Commissioner Lewis asked if the steel industry would prefer reductions in rates if the consequences were impairment of transportation service.

Asks Relief From Uncertainty

J. M. Gross, for the Bethlehem Steel Company, said steel producers were unanimous in their belief that present subsidies on steel products and raw materials used by the industry were "too high and must be reduced."

PROTESTS U. S. VALUATION

Proposed Tariff Plan Would Aid Germany, Says H. E. Miles

Washington, Jan. 23.—(By A. P.)—Protesting against any American valuation plan in the proposed "permanent" tariff bill, H. E. Miles, of Racine, Wis., chairman of the Fair Tariff League, told the Senate Finance Committee today that this proposal would offer no remedy whatever against importations from Germany, which alone disturb us.

"If an article costs \$1 in Germany, \$1.50 in England and \$2 in the United States," said Mr. Miles, "the American valuation proposal would make each importation pay, say, 30 per cent duty on the American valuation of \$2, being sixty cents duty. This would make the German article, duty paid, \$1.00, with the English article \$2.10, the American article remaining \$2. This 20 per cent leaves Germany 25 per cent below England and 20 per cent below domestic prices."

SADLER FUNERAL MARKED BY EXTREME SIMPLICITY

Governor, Supreme Court Justices and Officials at Services

Carlisle, Pa., Jan. 23.—(By A. P.)—Extreme simplicity marked the funeral today of Lewis S. Sadler, State Highway Commissioner, who died last Friday. Services were conducted by the Rev. Glenn M. Shafer, of the Second Presbyterian Church of Carlisle.

Hundreds of persons, including State officials and leaders in politics and finance, thronged the spacious grounds at Thornwold to pay their last tribute of respect to the widely known State officer. Members of the Cumberland County bar, county officials and students of the Dickinson School of Law attended in a body.

There were no honorary pallbearers. The active bearers were the first and second vice presidents of the Farmers' Trust Company of Carlisle, of which Mr. Sadler was president, and six employees of the company. Interment was private in the family mausoleum in Ashland Cemetery, Carlisle.

Numerous men of prominence in political, judicial and industrial fields left Broad Street Station at 11:55 o'clock this morning to attend the funeral.
