WOMAN DOCTOR
KILLED, 3 HURT
IN AUTO CRASH

Dr. Ella Everitt Loses Life When
Truck Hits Car at Twenty-
third and Thompson Sts.
2 OTHER PHYSICIANS AND
CHAUFFEUR IN HOSPITAL
Rushed Back to Institution Few
Minutes After Finishing
Day's Duty There
COLLEAGUE IS PROSTRATED
Falls in Faint After Viewing
Body—Other Driver
Being Held

Dr. Ella B. Everitt, widely known woman physician, was killed almost instantly, and two other women physicians and a Negro chauffeur were hurt today when an auto truck crashed into Dr. Everitt's motorcar.

The accident occurred at 3 P. M., at Twenty-third and Thompson streets, a few minutes after Dr. Everitt had driven away from the Woman's College Hospital, Twenty-first street and North College Avenue.

Dr. Everitt, who was fifty-five years old, lived at 1807 Spruce street and had an extensive practice. She had left the hospital accompanied by Dr. Marnetta Vogt and Dr. Miguelo Gemill, a Chinese physician studying at the institution. Arthur Bradley, a Negro, was driving her car.

The crash partly wrecked the physician's car and flung the occupants to the street. Dr. Everitt and the others were taken to the hospital in other cars. Dr. Stiers, also a woman physician, pronounced her colleague dead and then almost collapsed from shock.

Dr. Gemill is seriously injured, while Dr. Vogt's injuries are slight. The chauffeur was treated for bruises of the body. The driver of the truck went to the hospital, where he was placed under arrest.

Pioneer Woman Physician
Dr. Everitt was one of the pioneers among women on surgery. She was born in Danville, Va., of Scotch-Irish ancestry. In 1880 she was graduated from Wilson with the degree of bachelor of arts and immediately afterward entered the Woman's Medical College.

After her graduation she became a resident at the hospital and remained until 1892, when she took charge of the Northwestern Hospital for Women and Children in Minneapolis. Later she became assistant physician and gynecologist to the State Hospital for the insane at St. Peter's, Minn.

Three years later she took up private practice at Mankato, Minn. Later she returned to Philadelphia to take charge of the Woman's Hospital. She held the office of chief resident, gynecologist and was a fellow of the American Academy of Medicine.
