Attacks on Jews Are "Wanton and Hateful," Rabbi Declares

Attacks on the Jews by Henry Ford are wanton, hateful and couched in the misleading guise of professed friend

kopf, who defended the Jews as a race "clinging to right and justice and actuated by a spirit of genuine love," in an address before the First Assembly of the State Federation of Temple Sisterhoods, at the Hotel Lorraine, Broad street and Fairmount avenue, today. Foes and critics of the Jewish people were vigorously assailed for false no-tions circulated about the racial beliefs.

"Henry Ford professes to be a real friend of the Jews," declared Dr. Krauskopf. "He insists he is acting under the theory that the 'surgeon's knife heals as well as hurts.' That is the most STEAL HIS EGGS; AUTO LEFT is a false banner, employed by many who seek your friendship while ruining your fortune."
Declarations by Ford were character-

ized as really "the voice of Jacob, soft and sweet, disguising the hand of Esau,

hard and harsh."

"On all sides we hear people saying the Jews are taught hatred almost from the cradle. Nothing could be more false," continued Dr. Krauskopf. "An eye for an eye, a tooth for a tooth, truly is a law founded by the Jews, but never have I heard of its being enforced by them.

"Fifteen hundred years before Jesus came to earth," the rabbi declared, "Moses was teaching the same doc after loading it and then finding they Jewish people. Jesus himself and all His disciples were Jews. And after the Romans had crucified Jesus, He
