# REMORSE STRICKEN. MRS. ROSIER IS **CLOSELY WATCHED**

Wails Hysterically for Slain Husband and Baby as She Paces Cell

### CORONER'S INQUEST WILL TAKE PLACE TOMORROW

Mrs. Catherine Rosier, back in her cell at Moyamensing after her visit yes. terday to the chapel where her murdered husband's body lay, was so shaken today by remorse and fear that she threatened again to kill herself. She is in a state bordering on col-

lapse, refusing food, and crying constantly for her husband and her baby. A strict watch is being kept on her day and night.

At the time of her husband's funeral vesterday, the body of "Jerry" Reckitt, the young stenographer whom Mrs. Rosler killed last Saturday when she murdered her husband, was being buried quietly from her parents' home.

Mrs. Rosier's first hysterical outburst on her return from viewing her busband's body, prison attendants say, was when her fine clothes were taken from her and she put on, against her will, the rough prison gingham. Shrieks and Sobs

She shricked and sobbed alternately calling for her buby and her husband. At times she would sit for ten or fifteen minutes, tense and with fixed gaze, staying at the blank prison wall, then suddenly scream violently. The alarmed attendants called in the woman physician and she gave Mrs. Rosier an

Valuation of the Philadelphia Rapid Transit Company was placed today at \$250,000,000. This figure includes the cost of the entire system. On this amount the Public Service Commission will be requested to base a permanent

The concluding item, which went to complete this total, was one for "going concern" value, at \$38,000,000. This claim for the intensible assets named caused a prolonged controversy when the proceedings were resumed before Public Service Commissioner Clement

## POPE IS ENTOMBED WITH SOLEMN AND **IMPRESSIVE RITES**

Benedict XV Buried in Pontifical Robe in Crypt of St. Peter's

### CROWDS ARE REQUIRED TO LEAVE CATHEDRAL

By the Associated Press Rome, Jan. 26,-Pope Benedict XV vas entombed with solemn and impres sive ceremony this afternoon. His body, inclosed in three caskets and dressed in the pontifical robes, lies in a crypt

under the great basilies of St. Peter's. to the right of the entrance. The historic and beautiful ritual was witnessed only by members of the

Sacred College, members of the ponti-fical household and the papal nobility and diplomats accredited to the Vatican. The great bronze doors of St. Peter's had been closed at noon, cutting off the stream of humanity which for more than three days had been passing before the catafalque where the body lay in state.

The ceremony began with the removal of the body from the chapel of the Holy Sacrament to the chapel of the choir. It rested upon a bier which was borne upon the shoulders of red-robed ushers. whose usual functions are to carry the lope in the papal chair in pontifical
