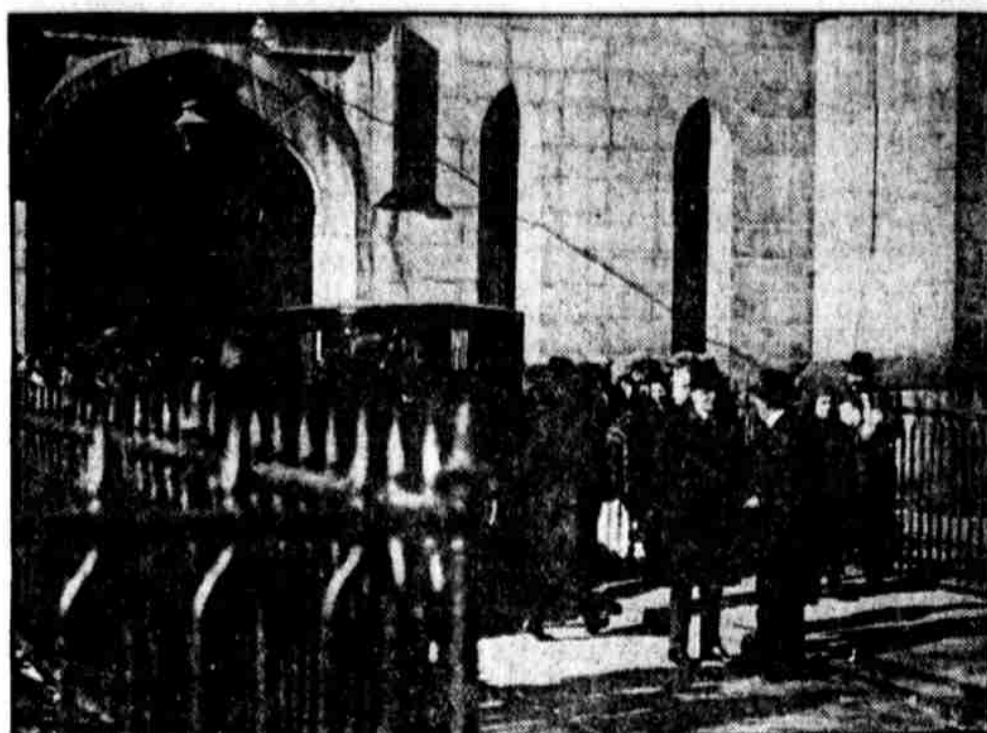




LEAVING MOYAMENSING. The prison door was still open when the camera clicked, as Mrs. Oscar Rosier left to take the last look at her dead husband.

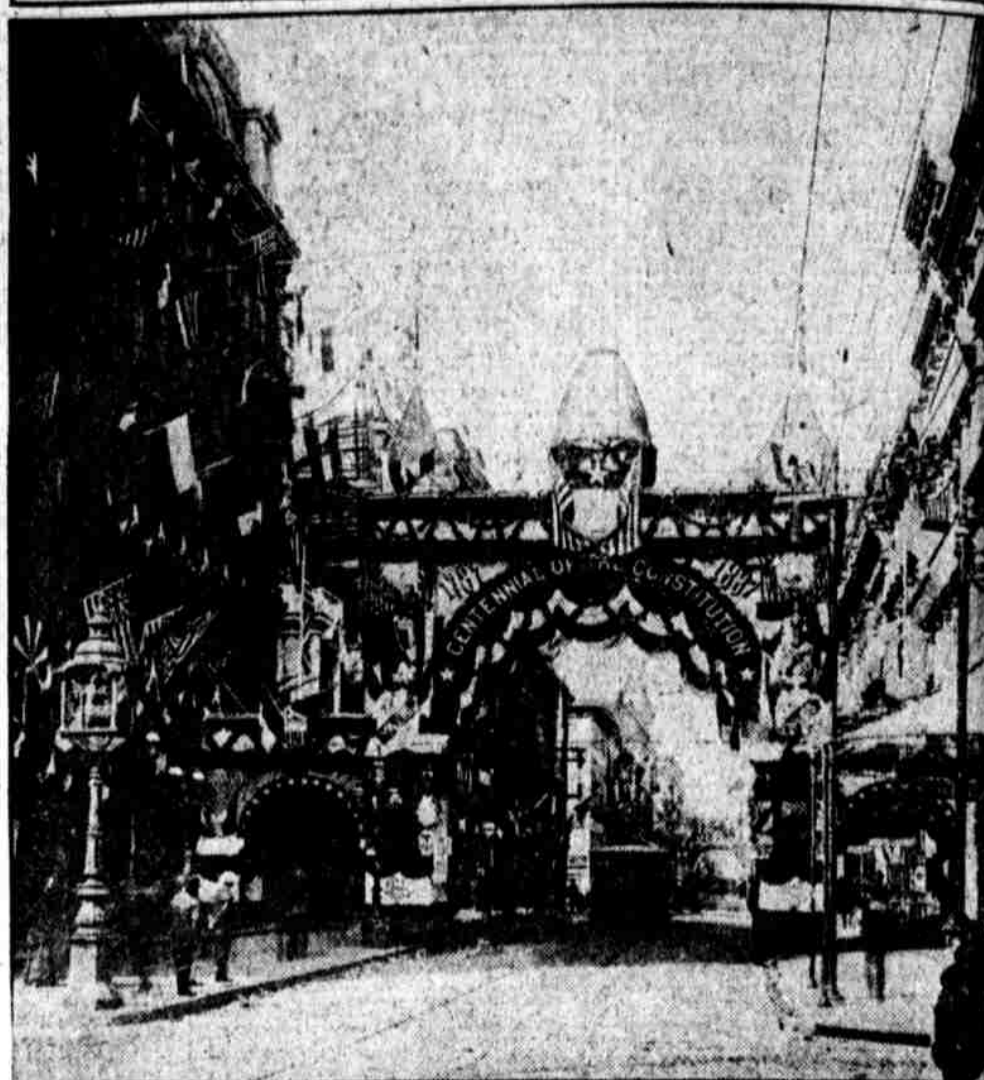
