Addresses were delivered today by Dr. Myron Ross Taylor, Dr. L. R. Thompson, of the United States Public Health Service; Dr. Frank A. Craig and Dr. F. S. Kellogg, of Pittsburgh.

"Ignorance on the part of girls and boys as to the duties and the legal intricacies involved in marriage could easily be avoided," she said, "if every college in America instituted a special compulsory course in domestic relations. Every youth and every girl should be instructed as fully in the dangers of the marriage relationship, just as they are instructed in the fine points of economics and biology. If this were done, young girls would enter the marital state with a different conception of its realities than those she conceived from picture plays.

NUMBER OF MARRIED MEN IN U. S. SLOWLY INCREASING

Gain, However, More Than Offset by Divorces Granted

Washington, Jan. 26.—(By A. P.)—The proportion of married men to the total male population of the country fifteen years of age and over increased from 35.8 per cent to 36.2 per cent in the ten years preceding the 1920 census, according to a compilation of marital statistics made public today by the Census Bureau. The bureau held, however, that this was probably more indicative of a change in the age composition of the population—an increase in the percentage of males between fifteen and twenty years of age due to increased immigration—than a growing propensity to matrimony.

Of the total male population of 68,900,431 above the fifteen-year classification, the census figures showed 21,849,296 married, 1,758,308 widowed, and 235,254 divorced, the latter figure, however, including those who had remarried. The divorce total showed an increase of 20 per cent in its ratio to the total population during the ten year period, constituting six tenths of one per cent of the latter against five tenths in 1910. The number of divorced women exceeded men by approximately 40,000.

RESEARCH BUREAU ASKS CRIME SURVEY

Must Have Facts to Check Banditry if It is Increasing, Says Report

RESULTS IN WEST CITED

A crime survey is needed in Philadelphia, the Bureau of Municipal Research asserted today. It said the door has been opened by the Board of Judges, of the Common Pleas Courts, which authorized a study of the administration of criminal justice in this city.

"We want to know if there really is a crime wave, and if there is, what has caused it and how it can be checked," the bureau stated in its weekly bulletin.

"We are even more anxious concerning the assertions of those who have studied the subject, who tell us American cities are in the grip of a permanent wave of crime. If there has been a recent increase in the amount of crime, the increase is a relatively unimportant matter when compared with the normal amount of crime in the American city as compared with that in foreign municipalities."

CANADIAN TUG SEIZED

Vessel Believed Carrying Liquor Consigned to Perth Amboy, N. J.

New York, Jan. 26.—The Harbinger, a green tug with black funnels, bore into the East River at daybreak today and promptly was taken into custody by the revenue cutter Greenard, for inspection by customs officials.

The tug sailed from St. John, N. B., recently, bound for Nassau in the Bahamas Islands. United States customs officials were informed she carried 300 cases of Canadian whisky, consigned to Perth Amboy, N. J., and requested that her possible entrance to American ports be temporarily suspended until she had declared he shot in self-defense.
