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**BILES TO DIRECT HIGHWAYS WORK**  
Plans Made by Late Commissioner Sadler to Be Carried Out  
**BIG PROGRAM MAPPED OUT**

Harrisburg, Jan. 27.—Plans of the State Highway Department for the 1932 construction season, as tentatively decided upon during the lifetime of the late Highway Commissioner Lewis S. Sadler, will be carried out.  
This announcement was made today by George H. Biles, Assistant Highway Commissioner, who, following a statement issued by Governor Spruill on Tuesday, will direct the affairs of the State Highway Department.  
"Commissioner Sadler strove to give Pennsylvania what he called 'the greatest highway system in America,' and he continues to be the aim of the State Highway Department," said Mr. Biles today. "During the coming season the Department, so far as its limited resources permit, will connect as many as possible of the already constructed sections of primary highways. At this time there are under contract for construction approximately 250 miles of roadway. It is hoped that Pennsylvania will maintain its position of supremacy in the construction of durable highway systems in America."  
Commissioner Biles has been with the State Highway Department since June of 1925, when he was appointed chief draftsman. Prior to that time he was in the Philadelphia Department of Public Works. In June, 1920, he was named division engineer in charge of the construction of Pennsylvania and connected for the State Highway Department some of the first experiments in bituminous road materials. As division engineer he supervised the construction of the famous Lewistown Narrows model road, the first highway built under the Spruill highway act. He also built the river drive out of the city of Harrisburg.  
In December of 1922 Mr. Biles was appointed assistant to the chief engineer and in 1923 he became maintenance engineer, organizing the maintenance division and state-aid roads. In June of 1925 he was named Second Deputy State Highway Commissioner, and in 1928, in addition to his supervisory duties, was placed in charge of all construction and administrative work. When Lewis S. Sadler became State Highway Commissioner Mr. Biles was named Assistant Highway Commissioner.

**MULTIPLICITY OF LAWS PERIL, ASSERTS SENATOR**  
Chief Danger to U. S. Government Internal, Says Robinson

Albany, N. Y., Jan. 27.—If the government ever fails the calamity is less likely to result from external attack than from the decadence of the institutions which constitute its foundation, Senator Joe T. Robinson, of Arkansas, said in an address today before the Ohio State Bar Association.  
He decried the practice of making thousands of laws, said that the Dred Scott Anti-Lynching Bill was unconstitutional and would fail to curb lynching, that it was of prime importance to enforce the prohibition amendments and maintained that the remedy for strikes cannot be found in laws compelling workers to continue their labors.  
Senator Robinson said that the prohibition enforcement problem challenges contemptuously and defiantly the power of the government. "But there is no alternative," he said. "The law must be enforced. Good citizens cannot in honor respect and observe only such laws as they approve and connive at statutes which they regard as doubtful or unwise policy. This would exemplify the triumph of anarchy over government."

**GAS BLAST KILLS CHEF**  
Philadelphia Victim of Explosion in Shore Restaurant

Atlantic City, Jan. 27.—Not realizing that the gas was turned on, Morris Goldwasser, a chef employed at the Broadway Restaurant, 2041 Atlantic avenue, died in the City Hospital as the result of the explosion when he attempted to apply a match to the burners of a gas oven yesterday.  
Goldwasser, who was thirty-one years old and married, came here recently from his home, at 1852 North Eighth street, Philadelphia. When the explosion occurred he was thrown back and apparently struck his head, for when waiters and patrons rushed to the kitchen he was lying on the floor unconscious.  
A son was born to Mrs. Goldwasser in Philadelphia, two days ago.

**ADLER JURY DISAGREES**  
Unable to Reach Verdict in Trial for Attack on Woman

Atlantic City, N. J., Jan. 27.—After deliberating twenty-one hours, a jury in Criminal Court disagreed in the case of Adolph Adler, Jr., son of a wealthy shore lawyer, charged with a criminal assault on Mrs. Margaret Formentis, now in the City Hospital, but formerly a resident of this city. Judge Ingersoll discharged the jurors. No date was set for a new trial.  
Adler was charged by the young woman with attacking her while on an auto ride. The defense was an alibi. Several witnesses testified that Adler was in this city at midnight, while the alleged attack occurred early in the morning, according to Mrs. Formentis. Adler's young wife declared he was home by 12 o'clock on that night.

**VIENNA CABINET BACK AGAIN**

Giovanni Verga, Novelist, Dead  
Rome, Jan. 27.—(By A. P.)—Giovanni Verga, noted Italian novelist and poet, died here this morning at the age of eighty-two years. One of his best-known works was "Cavalleria Rusticana," from which Mascagni's opera was adapted. He also acquired fame by his short stories and sketches of Sicilian peasantry. He was born at Catania, Sicily, in 1840.
