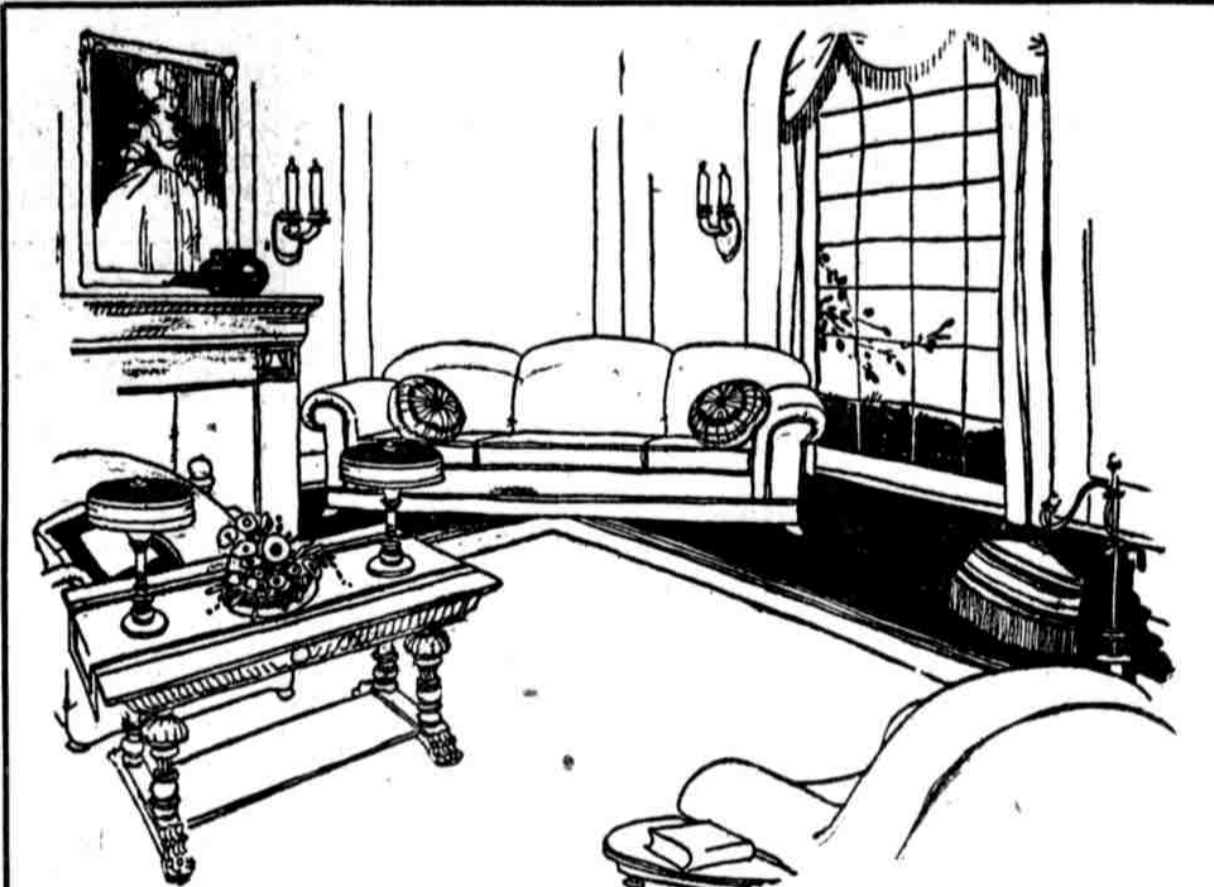

WIRE HEARS EIGHT ON PHONE; GETS AID

Police Reach Wayne Garage Just as Hatchet is Raised for Finishing Blow

"LODGER" HITS WATCHMAN



MRS. ANNA BELL Only the quick wit of Mrs. Anna Bell, telephone operator at Wayne, Pa., who summoned the police to the scene of the struggle she heard over the wire early Sunday morning, prevented the murder of Cecil Stanford, night watchman in a garage, by a drug-maddened addict.

"At 2 o'clock Sunday morning," said Mrs. Bell, "things were very quiet here, when the signal flashed from the Love Garage, over on Lancaster pike. I plugged in, and at first I could hear only a crash and then a voice said, 'Give me that money.'"

"After that there were blows and curses, and it sounded as though the furniture was being broken to pieces. I called the Radnor Township police at once."

Patrolmen Smith and Bones were dispatched to the scene and broke in, guns in hand, just as a strange man was lifting a hatchet above the prostrate form of Stanford.

The assailant dropped his weapon and surrendered, while Dr. Edgar Miller was summoned to tend Stanford, who was unconscious on the floor, with the blood streaming from three gaping wounds in his head.

When taken before Captain of Police Sweeney, the accused gave his name as Thomas Williams, twenty-eight, of Berwyn, where his victim also lives.

"He came into the garage Saturday night during the storm," said Captain Sweeney, "and asked for a place to sleep. Stanford told him he could sleep in the office, and gave him a couple of blankets for a bed."

"Before going to sleep he asked Stanford to lend him five dollars. This was refused, and he went to bed, apparently satisfied."

When Stanford went into the office at 2 o'clock yesterday morning, Williams demanded he turn over the contents of the cash register. This Stanford refused and Williams attacked him with a hatchet.

"A fierce struggle followed. They fought all over the room, knocking over furniture and upsetting the telephone. Williams succeeded in hitting the other man several times with his weapon."

"He has confessed he is a drug addict, and he wanted the money for more dope. He was willing to do anything to get it, and incidentally would have killed Stanford if he had not been prevented," Mrs. Bell is the one who saved his life.

Stanford was taken first to the police station for medical treatment, where Dr. Miller took thirty-two stitches in his head, and later sent to the Bryn Mawr Hospital, as soon as the condition of the roads would permit. His condition is serious.

Williams was given a hearing today before Magistrate Price and held without bail to await the result of Stanford's injuries. Captain Sweeney has expressed his intention of writing to the Bell Telephone Company in commendation of Mrs. Bell, whose quick thinking, he says, was the means of saving a human life.

"Oh, anybody would have done the same thing," says Mrs. Bell, a young widow. "One naturally would call the police when murder is being attempted."
