

PRINCE YAMAGATA IS DEAD IN JAPAN

Was Among Last of "Elder Statesmen" Who Restored Power of Mikado

London, Feb. 1.—Field Marshal Prince Yamagata, one of the few remaining of Japan's "genro" or elder statesmen, died at his home in Odawara today, says an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Tokio. He was in his eighty-fourth year.

Field Marshal Prince Arimoto Yamagata was one of the three survivors of the "Genro" or Elder Statesmen of Japan, who played a distinguished part in the restoration of the Japanese royal house. The two remaining members are Marquis Matsukata and Marquis Nono.

As a member of that body, Prince Yamagata was one of the personal advisers of the throne and he wielded special power because it was he who built up and became a supreme head of the Japanese Army as it is known today. He was frequently called the Japanese Moltke.

Prince Yamagata maintained an attitude of friendship toward America. In a letter, written to President Hoge, in 1921, he appealed to American leaders to thought and affairs for hearty cooperation with "the leading men on this side of the Pacific" (the Far East) for the restoration of the traditional friendship between the two nations. He declared that Japan's fixed policy was to maintain the most cordial relations with America and that he was convinced that the problems arising between the two countries were all amenable to amicable adjustment if the leaders of both sides sincerely endeavored to understand them and applied in their solution sound sense and broad statesmanship.

Helped Overthrow Shogunate
Prince Yamagata was born April 22, 1838, the son of a samurai of Choshu.

certain modifications, adopted in Japan. Another of his incidental achievements was the abolition of the sword-wearing habit of the samurai classes. It was a difficult task and a dangerous one to combat that tradition, but he succeeded in getting an imperial edict of abolition, and was forced enough to have it obeyed.

Formed Mikado's Cabinet
During this period when the country was witnessing the beginnings of constitutional government, Yamagata visited Europe again to study the local self-government systems, and on his return the Emperor summoned him to form his first Cabinet, which lasted from 1889 to 1891.

In the war with China Yamagata commanded the First Army Corps, winning decisive victories at Pingyang and Chio-hen-cheng. He represented Japan at the coronation of the Emperor Nicholas of Russia and brought back from Russia the Yamagata-Lobanov convention in regard to Korea, where both Russia and Japan had for some time before been engaged in a constant diplomatic struggle around the person of the Korean monarch, who, after the murder of his wife, had fled to the Russian Legation for protection.

In the Russo-Japanese War he was chief of the general staff, and when Prince Ito went to Korea as resident general in 1903, Yamagata succeeded him as president of the Privy Council.

Prince Yamagata was a conservative to the last and resented the principle of party Cabinets to which Prince Ito, first among the Elder Statesmen, committed himself by the organization of the Seiyukai, and he was openly denounced by the younger and more progressive political elements as a reactionary whose influence was persistently exerted for the purpose of weakening the spirit of constitutional government, but among his followers, Prince Yamagata was almost idolized. The example of a scrupulously clean life and the observance of the old samurai or bushido ideals had much to do with this result.

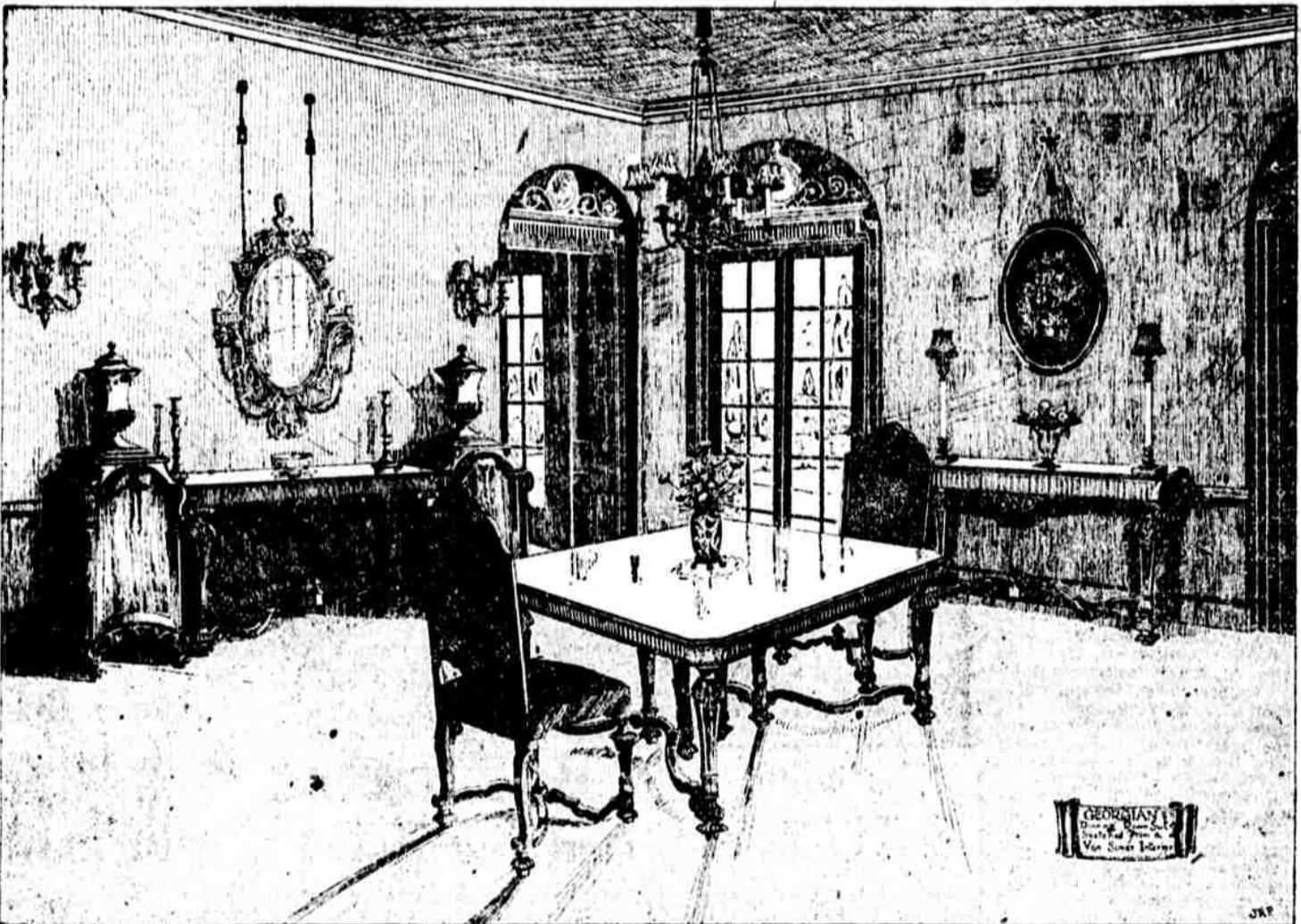
