Leave Some Native Recipes With Her

Mixture of Various Nationalities in Cooking Gives Some Delicious Results—Oxtails Instead of Kangaroo Tails

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MANY tales and stories of the Australian bush have been told, and the folks who have the wanderlust all bring back pictures that visualize to those who have seen them the wonderful country of the East.

Australia is a great cattle country, and many varieties of wild game are abundant. Fish is plentiful and of splendid variety, also the country is ideal for growing many vegetables. Many fruits that are considered luxuries are to be found growing wild. It is a very common thing to find where the soil is rich along the river banks, watermelon growing wild.

Mr. and Mrs. Albert Walter Doolittle, of Melbourne, have been visiting with me for two weeks, and are now on their way to England. I persuaded Mrs. Doolittle to prepare some of the native dishes, and I am now bringing them to you. Mrs. Doolittle says: "Serrant troubles are quite unknown; we have the Chinese Java boys and the quick-learning Filipino. They will garden and care for the lawns as well as help about the house.

"Our style of cooking is English, with a little French, Swiss, German and Chinese included; in fact, one would say cosmopolitan. The kangaroo and the wallaby are the most popular game; the tail of the kangaroo is considered a great delicacy."

Franchise of Kangaroo Tails
 We used oxtail in place of the kangaroo tails and it was delicious. Have the butcher cut two oxtails in pieces, wash well in warm water, wipe dry with a cloth and then roll in flour; brown three slices of salt pork in deep saucepan and place in the tails to brown, shaking occasionally so the tails will brown evenly. When nicely browned add

One quart of boiling water,
 Four onions,
 Two cloves,

One allspice,
 One blade of mace,
 One teaspoon of thyme,
 One-half teaspoon of sage,
 Rind of one-quarter lemon.

Simmer slowly for two and a half hours; now reduce the gravy by boiling and season with salt, pepper and serve with dumplings.

To prepare the dumplings:
 Place in a bowl
 Two cups of flour,
 One teaspoon of salt,
 One-half teaspoon of white pepper,
 Two teaspoons of baking powder,
 Sift to mix and add
 Four strips of salt pork,
 weighing about two ounces chopped very fine and browned in a skillet.
 One onion, grated,
 Two tablespoons of chopped parsley,
 One-half teaspoon of sweet marjoram.

Rub this mixture well into the flour and use ten tablespoons of water to form a dough; now drop by the spoonful into a pot of boiling water. Cook for fifteen minutes.

Mutton Chops in Batter
 Rub a baking dish well with good shortening and place in the dish one nicely trimmed chop for each person, then place in a bowl
 Two cups of flour,
 One teaspoon of salt,
 Four level teaspoons of baking powder,
 One-half teaspoon of pepper,
 One and one-quarter cups of milk,
 Two eggs.

One tablespoon of grated onion,
 One teaspoon of minced parsley.

Beat up to smooth batter and pour over the chops; bake in a moderate oven for one hour; now brush the top of the baked batter lightly with milk and sprinkle thickly with grated cheese and return to the oven to brown or toast the cheese.

Tomato Pie
 Drain one can of tomatoes and place

the juice in another bowl and mix with two tablespoons of sugar; stir to dissolve and bring to a boil. Cook for ten minutes.

Hasty Pudding Souffle
 Place in a saucepan
 One and one-half cups of milk,
 One-half cup of sugar,
 One-half cup of flour,
 Two tablespoons of melted butter,
 One-half teaspoon of nutmeg,
 One teaspoon of vanilla,
 Yolks of two eggs.

Beat to dissolve the flour and the sugar and bring to a boil. Cook for five minutes then remove from the stove and let cool. Now add the stiffly beaten whites of the two eggs by cutting and folding in turn in a buttered baking dish and bake in moderate oven twenty-five minutes. Serve with either fruit or vanilla sauce.

Kidney Toss
 Cut four lamb or mutton kidneys in pieces, place in saucepan and cover with boiling water. Cook three minutes and drain; now place in the skillet three tablespoons of butter, add the kidneys and toss and cook for five minutes. Now sift two tablespoons of flour over the kidneys and add
 Three-quarter cup of milk,
 Two tablespoons of cold water,
 One tablespoon of Worcester'shire sauce,
 Two tablespoons of chopped parsley,
 One-half teaspoon of salt,
 Pinch of pepper.

Heat to boiling point and cook for three minutes. Serve on toast, garnishing with finely chopped parsley.

Jugged Rabbit
 Have the butcher prepare a rabbit as for stewing. Now lay four slices of salt pork cut in strips in the bottom of deep baking dish, then some of the rabbit. Repeat until rabbit is all used, then place in a chopping bowl.
 One faggot of soup herbs,
 Three onions,
 Two ounces of salt pork.

Use this to season each layer of the rabbit. Add two cups of thick brown gravy, cover the dish close and bake in a slow oven for one and one-half hours. To serve, lift to hot platter

 is used in a good model at \$3, while at \$3.50 there is an excellent model with four deep bands of surgical elastic. Materials of increasing fineness are used in models at \$5, \$6 to \$11 for the finest girdle of silk broche. There is no lacing in any of these girdles and all hook in front. (Central)

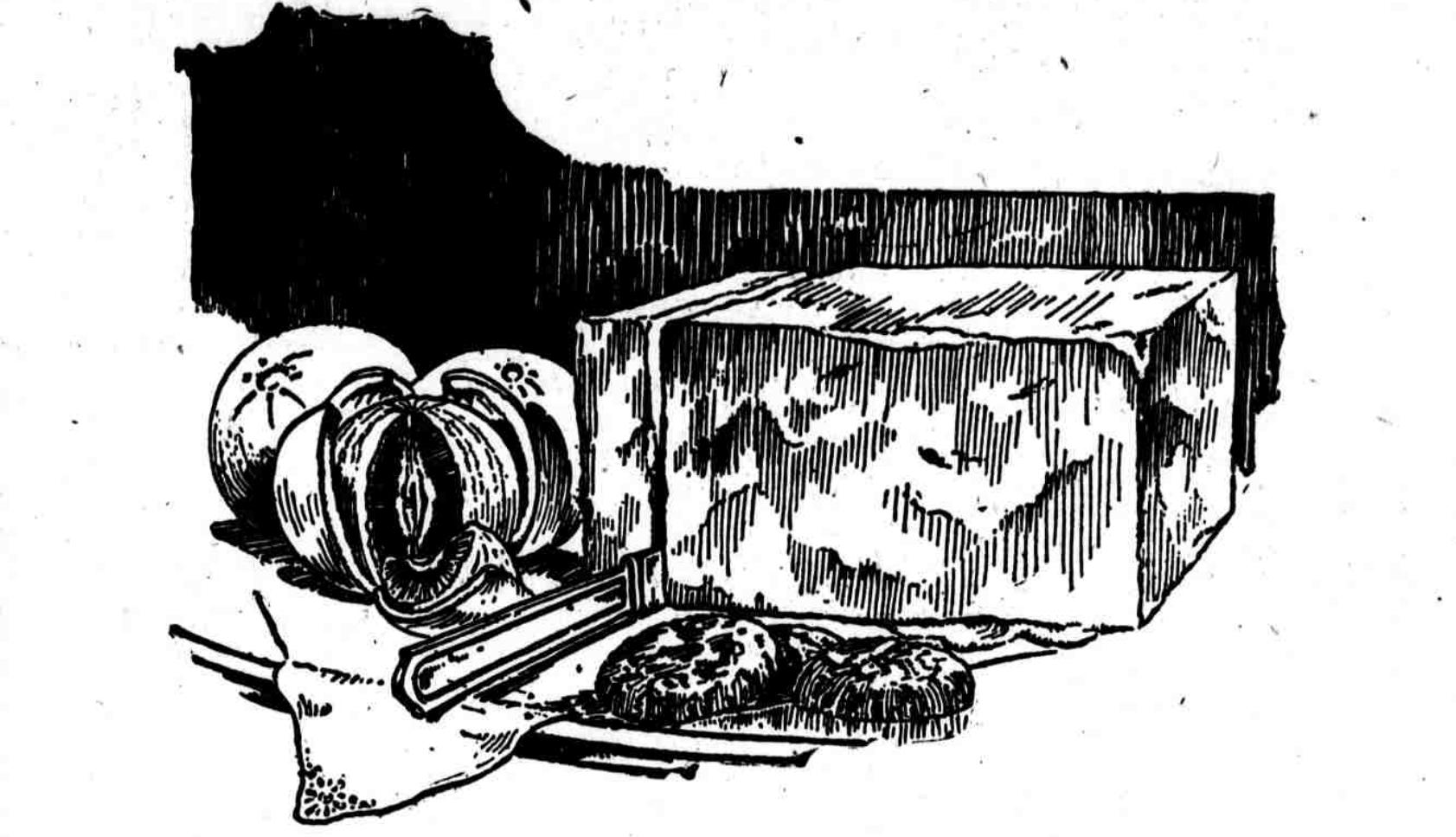
