"SORRY," SOBS BOY WHO SHOT BROTHER

Father Gives Blood for Transfusion and Saves Life of Son

VICTIM WILL RECOVER

Five-year-old Vincent Franzel, who accidentally shot his six-year-old brother Michael yesterday afternoon, is making preparations today at his home, 1935 South Juniper street, for the wounded boy's return home tonight. But Michael is seriously hurt and will not leave St. Agnes' Hospital for some time. His life was saved only through a blood transfusion operation submitted to by the father of the boys.

"I'm awful sorry I did it," was Vincent's comment today. His big, dark eyes were red from crying for his brother, whom he thought for a time he had killed.

The boys were playing about the house. Their father was at work and Mrs. Franzel was standing outside the house. Vincent pushed a chair up to a bureau and clambered up, finding, to his delight, his father's loaded revolver lying on top.

Mr. Franzel had taken the gun out of its case yesterday to clean it. Although he does not ordinarily keep it loaded, he had slipped in two cartridges. The children were delighted with their new toy and were playing with it on the floor when the gun was discharged.

Mrs. Rose Morello, the children's grandmother, heard the shot. She found Michael lying on the floor in a pool of blood, and his brother frantically screaming and trying to coax him. Taking the wounded child in her arms, Mrs. Morello ran downstairs. The two women ran screaming from the house and hailed an automobile, which carried them to the hospital.

At first it was thought the boy would get along all right, but he grew weaker. The father was sent for and the situation explained. He at once volunteered to give his blood.

Meanwhile the brother, Vincent, was inconsolable. It was only when told his brother would recover that his weeping ceased.

"He carefully avoids such a statement and the avoiding of this is more than a confession of his brother's serious illness. I sincerely regret the illness of Senator Crow and trust he will recover, but there is no evidence at all that he will do so.
