

Compensation Chief, First to Herald Stand in Race for Governor, Plays for Sproul

SELF-SEEKERS" FLAYED

Harry A. Mackey, chairman of the Workmen's Compensation Board, sketched the outline of his platform as a candidate for Governor in a statement issued today from his Philadelphia

He said he was for economy and efficiency, the elimination of useless city and State positions and offices, and for home rule for cities. He wound up by praising the work of Mrs. John O. Miller, chairman of the Pennsylvania whichever form you prefer, plasters | League of Women Voters, as a member of the Commission to Reorganize the Safe, gentle. Made in a world-famed | State Government, and making a bid for the woman vote. Mr. Mackey is first in the field with a platform.

A feature of the statement is the recognition of the work of the Sproul Administration.

The platform is built along lines specified by Senator Vare in an interview just before he left for Florida last night.

Chairman Mackey also boldly announced that if Senator Crow is unable to be a candidate he favors John A. Bell, Mayor Magee's ally, for the United States Senate. The Mackey ticket, as set forth in the statement, would be Senator Peppar and John A. Bell for the United States Senate, and himself for Governor.

Mackey's friends favor Colonel David J. Davis, of Scranton, for Lieutenant Governor. Chairman Mackey also surprised independents by declaring the leaders should "agree" on a man for Governor. Indirectly Mackey took a shot at the candidacy of Lieutenant Governor Beidieman.

Mr. Mackey opened his statement with the declaration that "no self-seeker" would ever gain the place. The people, he said, would not select a man "who goes up and down the State announcing his candidacy and exploiting his own qualifications."
