

Members of all American Legion posts are waiting with great interest and some anxiety for the appointments



The Charles C. McMenmy Post, 178, is to build at the corner of Rhawn and Craig streets, Holmesburg, a memorial building to be used as a meeting place for the post and for public purposes. Plans for the building of a basement hall on this site were approved at a meeting Monday night.

Harry Curtis, owner of the lot, offered it to the Legion for a nominal sum. Funds for the erection of the building will be raised by a commistee headed by W. B. Clare. A plan for the building will be contributed by T. W. Battin, a city engineer.

The movement to combine Harry D. Ingersoll Post, No. 174, and Benjamin Franklin Post, No. 405, sponsored principally by W. H. Du Barry and Dr. Morris B. Miller, has been abandoned for the time at least.

The idea of amalgamatoin had strong supporters in both organizations, and had the approval of Franklin D'Olier, past national commander of the Legion. Both the posts are prosperous and draw their memberships from the central section of the city. tion of the city.

At a meeting held early in the week the question was discussed in every phase. The conclusion, indorsed by a majority vote of the memberships of both posts, was that the Franklin Post would do better to lend its strength to some one of the smaller posts, that for lack of members or funds are in danger of discolution

N. J. ASSEMBLY ENDS MAR. 16

Senate Votes \$25,000 for State Building at Sesqui-Centennial Trenton, Feb. 8.—The New Jersey Assembly will conclude its 1922 session at 11 o'clock Thursday night, March 16, under the terms of a concurrent resolution adopted in both branches of

A concurrent resolution introduced just before adjournment in the Assembly would petition Congress to pass legislation permitting the manufacture and sale of light wines and beers. Another resolution seeks to change the terms of Assembly members from one to

two years.

Coroner's Jury Decides Shooting of Young Wife Was Accidental

Waynesboro, Pa., Feb. S.—While playing with an automatic pistol at the home of his uncle, Russell Steinbaugh, on Phin lelphia avenue, Monday evening, Harold Black, fifteen years old, shot and killed Mrs. Steinbaugh, twenty-two years old.

Mr. Steinbaugh and the boy were locked up overnight. Coronez Kinter held an inquest yesterday, and the jury returned a verdict of accidental shooting.






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

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
