Washington, Feb. 10.—National officers of the American Legion have left no doubt as to their attitude in regard to the Soldier Bonus Bill to department commanders in the States. The department commanders have full discretion in their own jurisdictions to keep the bonus question before the public and put pressure on members of Congress with respect to bonus legislation. "As a matter of fact, we do not regard the Bonus Bill as a political question," H. H. Rouse, member of the National Legislative Committee of the American Legion, asserted. "We regard it as an economic question."
