SAYS RAIL PAY IS TOO LOW

Expert Declares Freight Rates Have Risen More Than Wages... "Washington, Feb. 11.—(By A. P.)—Existing freight rates are 113 per cent above the schedules in effect in 1913, while wages of railroad employees are only 84.6 per cent above 1913 levels. Frank A. Wages, chief expert representing railroad labor unions, declared today before the Interstate Commerce Commission. Mr. Wages asserted that an insurmountable obstacle had been presented to attempts to fix the rate of wages of railroad employees prior to 1916, his comparison between the rates and labor scales could not be brought to the same time basis, because of the great majority of employees on railroads who are not receiving wage increases, but are receiving percentage increases of freight rates on one hand and wages on the other."

HARDING GETS MARKET BILL

House Accepts Senate Amendments and Passes Measure... "Washington, Feb. 11.—(By A. P.)—By a vote of 276 to 85 the House today accepted Senate amendments to the Farm and Operating Marketing Bill and sent it to the President for his approval. The measure, long before Congress in one form or another, would permit organization of marketing associations among farmers for co-operative dealing."

Harrisburg, Feb. 11.—William S. McKay, B. M. Africa, C. W.
