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MEE TO SETTLE WARSHIPS' FATE

Naval Board's Finding Will Doom Either Washington or West Virginia

EARLY DECISION SOUGHT

Washington, Feb. 14.—The Naval Board headed by Rear Admiral McElroy, appointed to make recommendations as to whether the superdreadnought West Virginia, under construction at Newport News, Va., or the Washington, being built at Camden, N. J., should be selected for retention under the naval limitation treaty, held its first meeting today.
