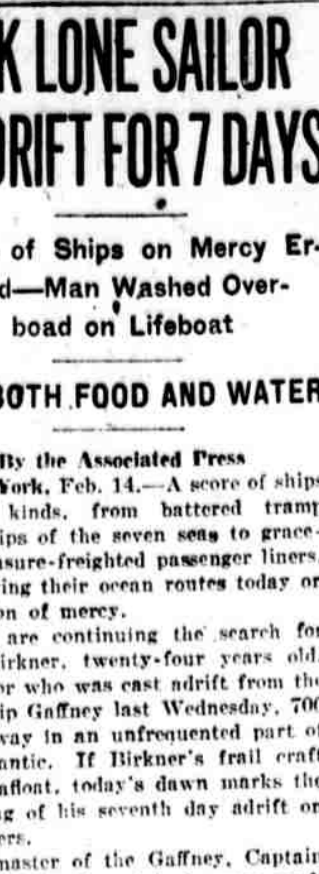

SMOKING BY GIRLS TABOO IN PHILADELPHIA SCHOOLS

Cigarette Fad Is "Vile and Vulgar," but Will Soon Pass, Say Deans of Women's Colleges

Smoking by women faculty members and girl students is not tolerated in this city and vicinity, according to an investigation made. Dean Hilda Smith, at Bryn Mawr, said: "We have had comparatively few violations. We cannot, of course, regulate the conduct of the students when off the campus. These rules against smoking are enforced by the girls themselves. The penalty is not expulsion for first offense."

Chicago, Feb. 14.—Smoking by girls is a vile, dirty, vulgar habit which should be prohibited in every university, but it is a fad hard to regulate, the deans of women at Chicago and Northwestern Universities said yesterday when informed of the statements from a Columbia University official that smoking was banned in the graduate teachers' college there only because it made the rooms so stuffy.

Madison, Wis., Feb. 14.—While there is no rule prohibiting smoking among women of the University of Wisconsin, F. Louise Nardin, dean of women, said yesterday there is an ethical principle held by co-eds which is making the habit unpopular.

Lafayette, Ind., Feb. 14.—A co-ed caught smoking at Purdue University would be dismissed from the university, once, declared Dean Carolyn Shuman, dean of women at the institution, when asked regarding her attitude toward co-ed smoking. No case of a girl student smoking has been reported, she added.

Miss Nardin said smoking women belong to the "idle, blase, disappointed class." An intelligent woman, she declared, "cannot see herself rocking a baby or making a pie with a cigarette in her mouth, flicking ash in the baby's face or dropping them in the piecru."

Louisville, Ky., Feb. 14.—Smoking by university co-eds is merely a fad that soon will pass, in the opinion of Miss Elizabeth Hoskins, dean of women at the University of Louisville. "I can't feel that a real, genuine womanly girl would form the habit," said Miss Hoskins yesterday. "The dean said there had been no case of smoking among girl students at the University of Louisville, because the South is a 'little more conservative than the North.'"

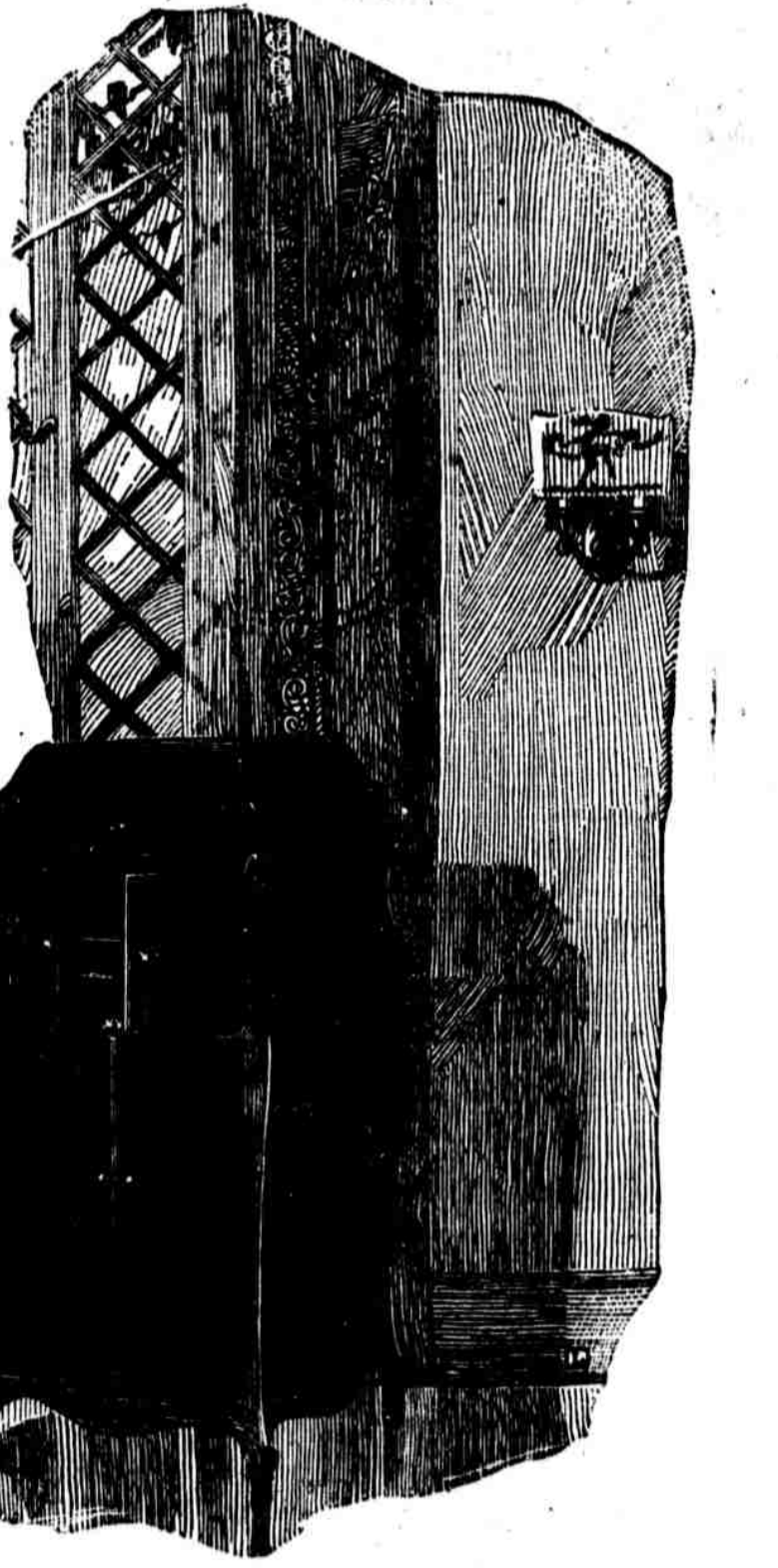
Columbus, O., Feb. 14.—About 1 per cent of co-eds at Ohio University smoke, Miss Louise Brown, acting dean of women, said yesterday. Every effort is made to discourage smoking among girl students. "It is a dirty habit," Miss Brown said, "harmful not only to girls who smoke, but in the effects on those who see them."

Minneapolis, Minn., Feb. 14.—Smoking by co-eds at universities is practiced just to be "smart" and there is very little of it at the University of Minnesota, Mrs. Jessie Ladd, dean of women, declared yesterday. "Although there is no rule forbidding the practice, the sororities at Minnesota have all spoken against it," Mrs. Ladd said.
