\$8500 AWARD FOR MURDER

Widow Gets Damages From Estate of Slayer's Husband

West Chester, Pa., Feb. 14.—Mrs. Marguerite Eichelberger, widow of Roy Eichelberger, whose murder at West-grove, on May 31, 1920, created a sensation throughout this section of the State, was awarded \$8500 damages from the estate of Frances Dunlop, her husband's murderer, in Common Pleas Court here.

Mrs. Dunlop shot Eichelberger as he slept beside his wife. She then killed her daughter, Lillian Dunlop, aged fifteen, and herself. It was alleged Eichelberger had been friendly with Mrs. Dunlop for some time, but had returned to his wife the day before the murder, Mrs. Dunlop killing him for revenge.

ROYAL FAMILY CRITICIZED

Expenditures by England's Rulers Stir Labor Party Member

London, Feb. 14.—(By A. P.)—Criticism of the allowances made to the royal family, and the expenditures on the Indian and Canadian tours of the Prince of Wales were made by John Robertson, Labor member of the House of Commons for Bethwell, yesterday in debate on the economy recommendations of the Geddes committee. Mr. Robertson said he was sure the royal family would be willing to economize "when so many women and children are starving."

Sir Donald MacLean, Liberal, termed the admiralty circular criticizing the Geddes report "unprecedented and unconstitutional." He complained of the pressing burden of taxation and suggested the best remedy was a change of government.

Ansten Chamberlain, replying for the Government, said that the opposition speeches had been directed to defeating rather than carrying out the Geddes recommendations.

FAREWELL TO SHACKLETON

Funeral Ship Will Leave Montevideo After Ceremonies Tomorrow

Montevideo, Feb. 14.—(By A. P.)—Military, naval and State honors will be rendered by the Uruguayan Government tomorrow to Sir Ernest Shackleton when his body is put on the British steamship Woodville, which will convey it back to South Georgia Island for burial.

After services at the English church the coffin will be placed on a gun carriage and conveyed to a pier with an escort of troops and followed by a procession of British organizations and representatives of the general public. Troops stationed at intervals along the
