

WOMEN BELIEVE UNWAS ATTACKER

Each of Them on Head With Blackjack, They Testify

HE IS HELD WITHOUT BAIL

When George E. Dennis, 7523 Sayre street, was arraigned before Magistrate Dugan today to answer charge of an attack on a fifty-eight-year-old woman, last Tuesday night, three women identified him as the man by whom they had each been attacked. The woman was a girl of sixteen.

The alleged attacks occurred in the same neighborhood within the last two weeks.

Mrs. Laura Alop, fifty-eight, 8051 Englewood avenue, identified Dennis as the man who accosted her last Tuesday night as she was on her way home about 9:45 o'clock. She said he stepped in front of her at a lonely spot, near Fifty-ninth street and Kingsessing avenue, and threatened her with a revolver. She made an outcry. She said the man then struck her over the head and

screeamed and patrolman ran to her aid and arrested Dennis as he was attempting to escape. Police produced a blackjack which they said they took from Dennis.

The blackjack was a piece of solid iron about an inch in diameter and about an inch long, wrapped in tire tape.

Catherine Dugan, sixteen years old, 211 Elmwood avenue, said she recognized Dennis as the man who was passing her one week ago as she was passing a lonely spot on Elmwood avenue between Sixty-ninth and Seventieth street. Dennis, she said, stepped from behind a signboard and holding a blackjack, said to her "stop and not to scream."

She said because of fright she could not suppress a scream, and then Dennis said to her "cut her throat if she screams again."

Mrs. Dugan said she remained quiet after that threat but that he struck her over the head and knocked her unconscious.

The third alleged attack by Dennis was made upon Mrs. Alberta A. Munger, twenty-five, 8 Greenway avenue, on the night preceding the attack upon Mrs. Alop.

Mrs. Munger broke down when asked the details of the attack. She became confused while trying to testify and sobbed bitterly as she was assisted from the stand.

According to the story she formerly gave the police, Mrs. Munger was attacked last Tuesday night at Sixty-seventh street and Grays avenue. Her assailant came up behind and grabbed her. She was stunned by a blow and dragged down an embankment to the side of the road.

One other woman present at the hearing had been attacked, but was unable to identify Dennis. Magistrate Dugan said Dennis without bail for the Grand Jury. Other charges of highway robbery, larceny and breaking and entering have been lodged against him.

DR. PHILLIPS COMING HERE

Accepts Call to Take Pulpit of Church of the Saviour

The Rev. Z. B. T. Phillips, of St. Louis, has accepted the call to the rectory of the Protestant Episcopal Church of the Saviour. Thirty-eight years old, he will arrive here May 1 to take up his new duties. He will succeed the Rev. Dr. Robert Johnson, who leaves April 1 to accept the call to St. John's Episcopal Church in Washington.

Mr. Phillips, who is widely known to Philadelphians, is a descendant of William Phillips, one of the famous New England clergymen. Dr. Phillips is a personal friend of General Leung and Wood, and it is believed that when General Wood takes office next year at the University of Pennsylvania, he will associate himself with the Church of the Saviour.
