BONUS BILL FACING INDEFINITE DELAY
 Committee May Let Measure Rest Until Debt Refunding Is Under Way
LIMITED HELP PROPOSED

 Washington, Feb. 23.—The soldiers' bonus question was allowed to slumber today, the special committee dealing with the question of ways of raising funds deferring further sessions until tomorrow. There was no indication when a decision would be reached, but some committee members said the bill probably would not be reported out of the committee this week or next.
 There still seemed to be a disposition to make haste slowly. Measures it was said that there was a growing sentiment among members of the House to postpone action until after the debt-refunding negotiations between the United States and the principal allied nations are put under way. In this connection Representative Longworth, of Ohio, ranking member of the committee dealing with finances, said there was reason to believe that some of the postponed refunding bonds would be in hand by July.
 At this time sentiment in the special committee seems to be for reporting out a bill carrying a manufacturers and wholesalers' tax similar to that in force in Canada, but with lower rates. This was discussed at sessions yesterday and, it was said, would be taken up when the committee resumes its sittings tomorrow. This or any other form of sales tax is strongly opposed by approximately 100 House Republicans, whose leaders are mounting out an extended campaign of opposition all along the line.

In an open letter today to Chairman Forney, Representative Ansoorge, of New York, suggested a "selective bonus" for the sick, the wounded and the needy.
 "There are many ex-soldiers," Mr. Ansoorge said, "who do not need the bonus and do not want it, and in the present condition of our finances we should not force it upon them. Some method should be provided to divert that portion of the bonus to hospitalization and rehabilitation for the sick and wounded, thereby decreasing appropriations for that purpose."
 "Perhaps 50 per cent of our ex-soldiers would fall within the category of those who are in need of it, and in estimating the proposed bonus at from \$2,000,000,000 to \$5,000,000,000, one-half of this tremendous sum would be spent by the government."
 "I would call into existence for a short period the members of the selective draft board, before whom those entitled to the selective bonus would appear and the certificates properly witnessed and acknowledged. All others would be regarded as not in need of the bonus or not desiring it and as contributing their share to the sick and wounded."

TREASURY OPPOSES NEW BOND ISSUES
 Boston, Feb. 23.—(By A. P.)—America's position as a creditor Nation probably will result in the use of American capital wherever business is done, Eliot Wadsworth, Assistant Secretary of the Treasury, said in an address before the Boston Chamber of Commerce today. This expansion of commerce, he added, on the maintaining of "a pay-as-you-go" policy by the United States Treasury.
 "We are today \$27,500,000,000 of which \$6,500,000,000 is due in less than eighteen months," Mr. Wadsworth said. "This is too large a proportion of floating debt for any business institution."
 "Our Federal budget so far has balanced, but next year we face a deficit. We are considering further expenditures for Federal activities. To meet the deficit, to pay for these new expenditures, the money should be provided from income, not by further borrowing."
 "We have debts enough for future generations to care for. But as we go must be the principle of the financial management of this country or soon we will get into talking of limiting budgets abroad and will really have cause to worry about the future."
 Contrasting the great inflation of currencies abroad with the situation in the United States, the Assistant Secretary said that in the aggregate the holders of Liberty bonds had made a profit of \$2,500,000,000 in the last year and a half.

STERLING VOICES HOPES
 Democratic Chairman Predicts Successful Harmony Meeting
 Harrisburg, Feb. 23.—(By A. P.)—Democratic State Chairman Bruce F. Sterling today predicted a big attendance of Democratic men and women from all parts of the State in Harrisburg tomorrow. "The district has many men within the party and the most feasible candidates who will bring that condition about."
 The chairman met a number of Democratic county leaders earlier here, and while he would not discuss possible candidates or reported refusal of various men to attend, he enlarged upon what he considered good opportunities for the Democratic Party. He assailed the management of the State Government.
 Many prominent Democrats are expected here tonight when numerous conferences will be held.

SITUATION IN ITALY ACUTE
 "Dark-Horse" Premier Apparently Only Solution of Ministerial Crisis
 Rome, Feb. 23.—(By A. P.)—A "dark-horse" premier seems now to be the only feasible solution of the Italian ministerial crisis, since one after another of Italy's prominent politicians has declined the King's invitation to attempt the formation of a cabinet to succeed the Bonomi ministry.
 All hope of a combination of the constitutional parties under the ordinarily heralded premier possibilities today appeared to have been abandoned. Each faction has adopted a bitter attitude against the others, casting the blame for the present situation upon all but its own particular group.

GOV. RUSSELL HITS BACK
 Accuses Insurance Companies of Fostering Girl's Suit
 Jackson, Miss., Feb. 23.—(By A. P.)—Governor Lee Russell, in a special message to the Legislature today, charged the old-line fire insurance companies, which withdrew from the State last year following institution of anti-trust legislation, with fostering the \$100,000 reduction suit filed against him by Miss Frances Birkhead, of New Orleans, his former stenographer.
