**JOINT STOCK LAND BANKS OVERCHARGED BORROWERS**

Farm Loan Board Head Admits Illegal Exactions by Some Concerns

Washington, Feb. 27.—(By A. P.)—Charges of Senator Smoot and other Senators that borrowers from joint stock land banks in some cases had been charged illegal premiums were declared sustained in a report made to the Senate today by Chairman Lobdell, of the Federal Farm Loan Board.

In a letter Mr. Lobdell said: "That such charges have been made we know beyond question. Individual cases have been called to our attention and field investigation has developed considerable evidence. The number of banks involved and the opportunity for extortions we believe they have been surprisingly few."

Chairman Lobdell added that the board when it learned that borrowers were required to subscribe for the stock of two joint stock banks at a premium in order to secure loans, had issued an order stopping the practice and requiring the banks to take up the stock and to repay premium plus interest.

Chairman Lobdell reported that the Federal Farm Loan System's funds were "approximately adequate" to care for borrowers, as a result of the recent sale of \$75,000,000 of farm loan bonds and accumulation of other funds. Total applications for loans on January 1 aggregated \$142,000,000.

**WHISKY THIEVES JAILED**

Long Terms for Two Who Held Up Bootlegger

West Chester, Pa., Feb. 27.—Taylor Freeman and Herbert King, of Washington, D. C., recently convicted of holding up and robbing a bootlegger near West Grove over a year ago, were sentenced today by Judge Burler to periods of 18 and 24 months, respectively, in the Eastern Penitentiary of not less than five nor more than seventeen years.

Three other members of the gang who pleaded guilty were convicted and were sentenced to similar terms some time ago. They were Leroy Mason, Aaron Trechberg and C. C. McCurley, all of Washington.

The men held up the automobile of a bootlegger, secured 11 and ninety gallons of whisky and sold the booty in Washington.

**LACKAWANNA WETS DAZED**

State's "Wettest Spot" May Be Turned Into Sahara by Court

Seranton, Pa., Feb. 27.—Lackawanna County, talked of as the wettest spot in Pennsylvania, may soon become a real Sahara, however.

Judge Edwards, Newcomb and Maxey threw a bomb into the camp of the wet forces today when at the opening of License Court it was held that all applications for old licenses would be regarded as requests for new licenses. It took less than an hour to call the list of 750 applications. The liquor men, taken by surprise, put up nothing in the way of an argument as each case was called.

Court adjourned until Thursday morning without making any comment. It is being fairly predicted that the judges will refuse to grant a single license.

**DELAY CABLE CONFERENCE**

Allocation of Former German Lines Postponed for Few Days

Washington, Feb. 27.—(By A. P.)—Another postponement of the International Communications Conference was announced today by Acting Secretary Fletcher, of the State Department.

The conference, which is to pass on the allocation of all former German cables taken over by the Allies under the Treaty of Versailles, was to have had another meeting today. Mr. Fletcher, who was charged with preparation of a working plan for the conference, said today he had been unable to get his proposals in shape, and had asked the Allied Ambassadors composing the conference to postpone their meeting until later in the week.

**CHEAP EGGS FOR LENT**

Chicago Market Quotations Dropped Cent a Day for Ten Days

Chicago, Feb. 27.—(By A. P.)—Cheap eggs for Lent were signaled today by a new drop in quotations. Today's prices showed a fall of a cent a dozen per day for the last ten days. The wholesale quotation for five hundred eggs today was twenty-four cents, as against thirty-four cents on the corresponding day a year ago as well as for ten days back this season.

Most of the eggs received at the market today were from the reason assigned for the decline in the egg market, a decline in notable contrast with advancing values of late for other farm products.

**TWO SLEEPING GIRLS KILLED**

Third Shot At, but Unhurt—Man Attempts Suicide While Fleeing

Marlino, Tex., Feb. 27.—(By A. P.)—Two young women were shot and killed while sleeping early today and a third woman was fired at but escaped injury, about thirty miles east of Palestine, according to advices received here.

The young women killed were a Miss Solomon and a Miss Culbertson. The tragedy occurred at the home of the latter. The young woman who was fired at was a Miss Wilson.

A woman named Epton attempted to kill herself while being chased by officers, the advices said.

**96—The Jumping Straw**

Hold a long straw in the fingers of the right hand, with the other end of the straw resting on the table. American straws lie flat on the first one, at right angles to it. By giving a quick little flip, with the tip of the third finger, by the end of the straw held by the right hand, the other straw will be propelled into the air, although there is no perceptible movement of the right hand straw. By placing the left hand over the right, during the operation, the secret flip is entirely concealed from view.
