Oh, and I forgot to mention that the room was much decorated with tinsel and you cannot imagine how gorgeous this was when the flashlight and electric substances were turned on.

Another very striking Spanish get-up was that worn by Mrs. Hollister Sturges. Over a skirt of a green satin was draped a Spanish shawl of pink roses, and in her hair was a huge dark comb and some fetching ornaments. I was delighted to see Colonel Henry D. Lindsay, of New York, at the ball. You know, he is the past national commander of the American Legion, and he was looking very handsome in a Colonial costume. He is staying with the Sturgeses in Chestnut Hill. Another of their guests was Mrs. Rita Clapham, of Washington. Mr. Sturges was got up as a Scotch Highlander. Haette Biddle, who gave dinner before the ball, wore wonderful Chinese clothes, consisting of green satin trousers and a long coat of old rose satin embroidered in gold. Her hair was of red satin and gold, with a tassel hanging over one ear.

Another stunning effect was brought about by Mrs. Tom Dunn, who was entirely in black. Her skirt was short and fluffy and covered with sequins and the bodice and shoulder straps were entirely in black. Her hair was in little scales. On her head she wore a tri-corne hat made entirely of sequins. It was great! A smart ballet dancer was Mrs. Henry Weeks, whose entire outfit was in an orange sequins and she wore an audacious small hat on the side of her head. Mrs. Harry Thayer was a ballet girl, too, in a handsome costume, with blue-hung sash, with short, full skirt trimmed with clusters of red roses; with it she wore a bandeau of pearls and rhinestones. The decorations in the Russian style were most unusual and striking. Before the ball, both the Bellevue and the Ritz looked like fancy dress parties in themselves; there was scarcely a table without a guest in fancy costume and some very large dinners were given.
