LEGION IS FIGHTING PEPPER ON BONUS

Veterans Bombard Senator With Resolutions Asking Him to Reverse Stand

American Legion posts throughout the State have mailed protests or expressions of regret to Senator Pepper following his statement of his position on the bonus question in the Senate recently.

Most of the communications are copies of resolutions adopted by the posts, condemning the Senator's attitude. Some of them strongly censure him, while others merely "regret" that he has taken this stand. Many individuals also sent letters to him of a similar tone.

According to estimates made at State headquarters, at least 90 per cent of the Pennsylvania membership is in favor of the bonus, while less than 5 per cent of the veterans are willing to accept the cash option.

The time limit on the membership drive for the American Legion has been extended indefinitely, according to advices from State headquarters. More than seventy posts have passed their quota already, with others not yet heard from.

The State is being covered by a flying squadron of State officials of the Legion, including State Commander Thompson, National Liaison Officer Metz, Colonel Schonmaker and others. The party will reach Philadelphia next week to stimulate recruiting here.

SYMPOSIUM ON CULTURE

Sir Robert Falconer and Dean West Speakers at Public Meeting

The place and prestige of the humanistic branches in education and their application to life will be discussed tonight by Sir Robert Falconer, the Canadian statesman and publicist, who is now the president of the University of Toronto; Dean Andrew F. West, of Princeton; Bishop Philip M. Rhinelander, and Dr. Louise Hortense Snowden, adviser of women at the University of Pennsylvania. Various phases of the theme will be brought out in a symposium, "The Place and Function of Cultural Studies," by Dr. Rhinelander, Dean West and Dr. Snowden. Sir Robert will speak on "Humanism."

The meeting, at Houston Hall, of the University of Pennsylvania, will be open to the public without charge of admission and will begin at 8 o'clock. It will be held under the auspices of the Philadelphia Society for the Promotion of Liberal Studies, of which Dr. George Deque Hadzista, of the classical department of the University, is president, and of which President W. W. Comfort, of Haverford; former Provost Edgar F. Smith, of the University; Dr. Russell Conwell, of Temple University; President M. Carey Thomas, of Bryn Mawr; Rev. Dr. Robert Ellis Thompson, president emeritus of the Central High School; and Hon. John Wanamaker, are vice presidents. The public meeting will be preceded by the annual dinner and business meeting at the Hotel Normandie.

ATTORNEY HELD IN BAIL

Accused of Receiving Stolen Goods at Pawnshop Police Say He Owns I. Austin Wolfe, a lawyer, with office in the Penfield Building, was held in \$1000 bail by Magistrate Renshaw yesterday, charged with conspiracy and receiving stolen goods. His arrest grew out of charges made against Nathan Dickman, Thirty-second street and E. 13th, who was formerly employed by Wolfe, who, in addition to practicing law, the police say, is proprietor of a pawnshop at Seventeenth and Lombard streets. Dickman was arrested some time ago, charged with receiving eight revolvers, which, according to the police, had been stolen from Switt's pawnshop, Seventeenth and South streets.

According to Detectives Emanuel and Moriarty, Dickman said Wolfe had knowledge that much of the goods taken in at his pawnshop had been stolen.
