GERMAN BREWERS PLAN ANTI-PROHIBITION DRIVE

Fearing Dry Sweep, They Will Advocate Virtue of Beer

Berlin, March 3.—(By A. P.)—Minutes, which have just been published here of a recent secret convention of German and Swiss brewers, disclose that the brewers admitted they feared prohibition would sweep Europe.
