Atlantic City, March 6.—Plans for the mobilization of the Methodist for the State for the fall election, Sabbath observance, the enforcement of prohibition, and the prohibition of national and international representation for the lay on the convention floor are the outstanding features on the program of the eighty-sixth annual conference of the Methodist Episcopal Conference opening here on Wednesday in St. Paul's Church, with upward of 400 ministers, representing 286 parishes and 75,000 communicants attending.

Watch Legislature
The eyes of the conference members are focused upon Trenton watching the actions of the New Jersey legislature in passing "dry" bills to replace the Van Ness act recently declared unconstitutional. Passage of any enforcement legislation certain to win the approval of the legislature is a prospect of a drastic bill going through. Further, State Senator William N. Ronyon, of Union, who is regarded as the leading prohibitionist in the coming gubernatorial contest, is generally approved and United States Senator Frelinghuysen has read a supplementary bill announced against the prohibition issue.

Find a Lack of Serenity
