Motor Vehicles Must Halt Seventyfive Feet From Railway Tracks Harrisburg, March 6.—(By A. P.)— Motor vehicles carrying passengers or freight have been directed by the Public Service Commission in a general order to come to a full stop before crossing tracks of any steam railroad or

electric rai'way.

The order, which was issued as the result of investigation of numerous collisions between trains or electric cars and motor vehicles by the Bureau of

Accidents says:
"Such stops to be made not more than seventy-five feet from the nearest rail of the crossing and at points where he clearest view of approaching trains
