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INDIA-TURKISH NOTE MAY OUST READING

Viceroy Held Partly Responsible for Publication of Government's Communication

DERBY FOR MONTAGU'S JOB

 London, March 10.—(Special to the Associated Press.)—The removal of Lord Reading as viceroy of India, it is believed in some quarters, will be the denouement to the publication of the Indian Government's note. There is no doubt that the note on which to base this belief, but it is not improbable as a sequel to the virtual dismissal of Edwin Montagu as secretary for India.

The probable effect in India of Mr. Montagu's resignation is the subject of much curiosity, and there are some indications that the removal of the champion of Indian political reform have a dangerous repercussion there.

Equally momentous from the domestic political point of view is the which the whole of the country may be affected by the resignation, especially as to the position of Prime Minister Lloyd George. Some believe the chances that the Premier will resign have been considerably increased and that if he also takes the view that American abstention from the Geneva Conference lessens the prospect of success there, the country may soon learn of his definite retirement.

It is still unknown whether he intends to begin his holiday today, but in view of the threatened lockout in the engineering and shipbuilding trades, it is thought likely the viceroy will be prevented from attending the Washington Conference will again upset his arrangements.

The Earl of Derby, former Secretary for War, has been offered the secretaryship for India in succession to Montagu, according to reports in the parliamentary lobbies today. In the event of Lord Derby's refusal, the Duke of Devonshire is mentioned as the likely appointee.

All the newspapers give prominence to the Montagu incident and comment on his retirement.

As might have been expected, the Conservative press raises questions of joy, but it is noteworthy that the Liberal newspapers agree that his continuance in the India office was made impossible by recent events.

The Daily News, one of his warmest supporters, while expressing sorrow at the retirement of "one of the best Secretaries of State India ever had," says: "The difficulty of the Moslem problem in India hardly justifies such a complication of the no less difficult situation in the Near East, and cannot justify the formal announcement to France that our policy in Asia Minor is determined by the exigencies of our position in India." In this criticism the News includes Lord Reading.

The Westminster Gazette, formerly another cordial supporter of Mr. Montagu, condemns his on similar grounds. The Times, while approving his removal, says: "The circumstances which led to his resignation reveal a deplorable lack of co-ordination in the government, which must now give proof of its power to deal coherently and firmly with the great issues of the imperial policy or give place to some administration less dangerously divided against itself."
