**ARDEN LOAN SUCCESSFUL**  
 Communal Plan Runs Eleven Years  
 Without Loss or Default  
 Arden, Del., March 17.—An unusual  
 record of loans made without security,  
 totaling over \$17,000 in eleven years,  
 and without loss or default, is disclosed  
 in the annual report of the Ruffelsen  
 Gild of Arden Community.  
 The plan of operation was devised by  
 Burgomaster Ruffelsen, of Heddendorf,  
 Germany, sixty years ago, and has  
 been in operation in Central Europe  
 and India. The method is bor-  
 row funds on the joint promissory notes  
 of the organization's council, which are  
 loaned "for some productive purpose or  
 saving to the borrower," who gives his  
 note with two indorsees. All profits are  
 carried as a reserve surplus.
