## M'GRAW EXPECTS NO CINCH WINNING FLAG; HARD FIGHT PLANNED

Giants' Manager Believes He Will Be Threatened by Cards, Braves, Pirates and Reds-Has Lots of Talent Working Out in Camp

Sports Editor Evening Public Ledger San Antonio, Tex., March 17. JUST because he won the pennant in the National League and the world's championship, John McGraw shipped several carloads of players down here for spring practice and established one of the largest training camps in either league. Nobody was overlooked by the manager of the Giants. Pitchers. eatchers, infielders and outfielders were purchased by the dozen, and it took more than a week to learn each other's names.

During the practice sessions the baseball park was crowded to the water's edge, and it was feared that Henry Fabian would have to build side boards on the fence to keep the athletes from overflowing into the residence district. Men in uniform were every place, and research work was put on by Jawn and his assistants, Hugh Jennings, Cozy Dolan, Jess Burkett and Dick Kinsella, to discover some regular ball players. At this writing they still are researching.

It is difficult to figure why the large bunch of talent was brought bere for the official once over, because the Giants appear to be all set for the season with the exception of one outfield position. Irish Meusel will be in left and Ross Young in right field, and four high-class players are trying for the vacant place. The infield, with Kelly, Frisch, Bancroft and Grob as regulars, and Johnny Rawlings as utility man, is riding nice and pretty.

However, a tlock of aspirants seek infield positions. The catching staff will consist of Snyder, Earl Smith and Gaston, yet a half dozen others have hopes of stepping into the line-up. And MeGraw and his assistants are closely observing the work of every man on the field.

THERE are so many rookic pitchers that some of the names are not on the official list yet. The old stand-bys, meaning Jess Barnes. Douglas, Toncy, Art Nehf, Bill Ryan, Cecil Causey and Pat Shea are on the job, and one or two more would be welcomed with open arms.

#### College Spirit Shown by Players

DESPITE the large number of candidates for his varsity, McGraw has put the men through a strenuous three weeks, and it has been all for the best. The players have had no time to think of how they won the pennant, and later the World Series, and act like ordinary athletes with everything to gain and nothing to lose. In fact, the Giants are different from even last year, are not so cocky, and if they are confident of repeating, they are keeping it to

It took the infielders and outfielders just one week to get into condition. With Kelly this is easily the best infield in the league, and it not only is strong defensive combination, but also quite formidable on the attack. Bancroft is the only one who might fall below 300 in his hitting.

Johnny Rawlings, hero of the World Series, will be on the beach ready to step in if one of the regulars is injured. With him will be one or two rookies

At present, Bill Black, a Philadelphia boy, has the call. Bill played with Portsmouth last season, dazzled the natives with his sensational fielding and hit only a few points below .300. McGraw likes his work and that means he has a good chance to stick around

Walt Kopf. Larry's kid brother, also is a likely looking prospect, and the same goes for Howard Berry, the famous athlete from the University of Pennsylvania. Ed Hale, who gained fame at Mississippi University, looks very good, but lacks experience. He probably will be farmed out.

THERE are other candidates for infield jobs, but they never will see the bright lights in New York. They will be laid away in the elfalfa for further seasoning.

#### McGraw Anxious for Another Regular Pitcher

"I PROBABLY will carry two extra infielders besides Rawlings," said McGraw. "I have learned through experience that the best place for youngsters, who have shown more than ordinary ability, is on the bench with the regulars, where they can learn something. I tried it with Larry Doyle, Art Fletcher, Rube Marquard and many others and never was sorry.

"You have noticed the unusually large number of recruit pitchers at the ball park. I know the chances are slim to pick a few good ones from the crowd, but I don't want a few. All I want is one. If somebody could go out today and show me a man who is good enough to take his turn in the box and win a majority of his games, I will give him all of the others for nothing. Picking pitchers from green material is a big gamble, with the odds about

"The veterans, Jess Barnes, Douglas, Toney and Nehf," continued McGraw, calling off the names rapidly, "can be depended upon. I expect Causey to have a good year because he is a first-class pitcher and has improved considerably. Bill Ryan and Pat Shea also are due, and should be ready to take their regular turn.

"Virgil Barnes is ready for the big league. He has been with us on three training trips, and for two years we have farmed him out. Last year he was with Milwaukee and finished with a good record. I think he will help our ball club this season

'Art Nehf is the only left-hander on the club, but I am not worrying. don't think I need any more portsiders, but if I can get a first-class man I won't pass up the opportunity to buy him. But where can you get one? I will be perfectly satisfied if my right-handers come through. A good pitcher is a good pitcher, regardless of the arm he uses to throw the ball.

Claude Jonnard looks like the best of the recruits. He was with the club last year and beat the Phillies the latter part of the season, which is nothing to brag about. Jonnard was with Detroit in 1920, and Jennings says he looks like a different pitcher. Claude has but one eye.

McGLOUCHLIN, of Portsmouth, is another good prospect. He ... six feet three inches tall and throws a low ball which has baffed the hitters here. Others who have shown flashes of form are Benton. Melone, Proctor, Rachae, Shores and McFarland. All are right.

Stengel is sure to stay because he has taken off considerable weight, is faster and looks more like a ball player than at any time in the last two years. If he does not make the regular team he will be used for utility purposes and pinch-hitting Ralph Shinners, who was purchased from Indian polis for \$35,000 in cash
