

# Winston Churchill Intimates

## England May Again Be Forced to Employ Troops

### SITUATION GROWING WORSE

 London, March 22.—The British Government may have to consider whether it will be possible to draw a cordon of impervious troops between the British elements on the Ulster frontier, Winston Churchill, the Colonial Secretary, stated in the House of Commons today.

The situation in Ireland is going from bad to worse, and it is such that some trifling incident might draw the rival forces into a conflict which would shatter all prospects of peace in Ireland, the Dublin correspondent of the Times.

"The tragic irony of the situation," he adds, "consists in the fact that the vast majority of Irishmen of all parties deplore the danger, but seem unable to avert it. Each side daily takes some measure of defense which it regards as legitimate, but which produces prompt retaliation from the other side, with the result that political passions are intensified and the pleadings of common sense fail to find their way to the ears of the chief cause of resentment on the northern side of the border is the existence there of organized forces of the Irish Republican army, which the Northern Government insists must depart or be expelled before there can be any talk of peace.

"On the other hand, the Southern Nationalists claim the right to protect the Catholic minorities in the Northeast by every means in their power. They believe the Northern police cannot be trusted to act impartially.

"It is notorious that certain sections of the Irish Republican Army do not necessarily take orders from Dublin, and that raids of armed Republicans into Northern areas occur at times."

While the Northerners refuse to believe order will ever be maintained in the South, the attitude of either side is looked upon as pregnant with a thousand chances of disaster. The Times correspondent contends that the only thing necessary to avert a calamity is a frank exchange of views by the two Governments, but this has not yet been attempted.

Belfast, March 22.—(By A. P.)—Desultory firing continued all day yesterday from the Free State side of the border, along the frontier of Counties Tyrone and Monaghan, between Augustinian and Northern troops.

Reports from the Ballagh Bridge region declare that uniformed Irish Republican army members have been observed moving between the occupied houses, and are presumed to be relieving the sniping outposts.

Two families in the danger zone moved their entire effects to a safer place in the Tyrone County interior in consequence of their farmhouses being riddled by bullets. Similarly another farmer was forced to seek shelter with friends in the Caledon district. His house was immediately occupied by snipers.

The police report that the snipers are evidently good marksmen and possess up-to-date field glasses, judging by the prompt way in which they spot the movements of the opposing forces.

Large bodies of police have been ordered to the district, and this is reassuring the loyalists to some extent.

Dublin, March 22.—(By A. P.)—It was officially announced here today that the Irish Republican Army convention, the holding of which was recently forbidden by Arthur Griffith, president of the Dail Eireann, would be held in Dublin Sunday, as arranged. The announcement is taken here to mean that a definite split in the Republican Army has come.

According to Commandant Roderick O'Connor, director of engineering of the headquarters staff of the Irish Republican Army, 80 per cent of the army's members believe the army has been "let down," and that the Dail Eireann has been false to the Republic, and by agreeing to accept in its constitution of Ireland within the British Empire.

O'Connor said the army convention had been originally summoned with the approval of Richard Mulcahy, now Minister of Defense in the Dail Cabinet. He said the intention was to restore to the army its old volunteer constitution, under which it elected its own executive. The constitution was abandoned when the Dail Eireann was established as the republican government and the army swore allegiance to it as such.

Mulcahy, declared O'Connor, had pledged himself in the Dail to maintain the army as a republican organization, but the pledge had been violated by the invitations given the members of the army to form the nucleus of the army of the Free State, which O'Connor declared subverted the Republic.

He said the army convention would be held Sunday, as there was no Government in Ireland at present to which the army owed allegiance.

A resolution would be submitted to the convention, said O'Connor, renewing its allegiance to the Irish Republic and establishing an executive entitled to issue orders to the Irish republican army, which would then repudiate control by the Dail.

"You may, if you like, call us mutiny," added O'Connor, "but the rank and file is always right." It is the leaders who have failed.

O'Connor described as deserters the men who had left the republican army for the Free State army. He charged that the British army, during the Limerick difficulty, had asked the Provisional Government, and he alleged that there had been interference with the republican army by the Provisional Administration.

There are now five distinct armed forces in Ireland, O'Connor declared, but he claimed the body he represented was the army of the people. He said his views were shared by Eamon de Valera.

200 Quail Freed Near City
