Her hat was a small model of black straw made with a narrow brim and trimmed with black crepe ribbon arranged at each side with long loops which fell over the brim.

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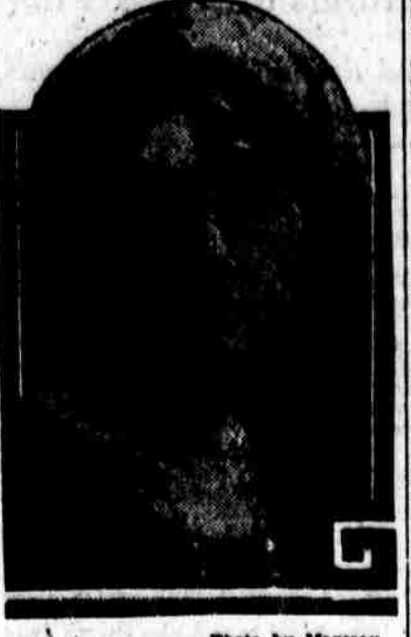
