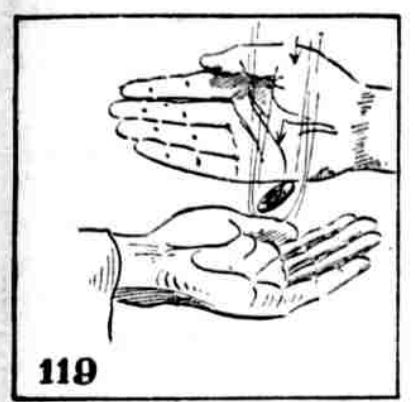
Ex-Service Men Direct Funeral of Overseas Hero Killed Here
