

REFUSES DIVORCE TO MRS. BOURGEOIS

Chancellor Calls Wife of Atlantic City Lawyer "Insanely Jealous Woman"

MRS. LACIER EXONERATED

Special Dispatch to Evening Public Ledger Atlantic City, April 3.—Characterizing the wife of George A. Bourgeois, prominent shore attorney, as an "insanely jealous woman," Chancellor Walker today filed an opinion in Trenton dismissing her petition for divorce.

Mrs. Muriel N. Lacier, attractive widow of a former Baltimore physician, now residing in Ventnor, who was named as co-respondent, was exonerated by the court.

The Chancellor held that the proof submitted was totally circumstantial. He held that the only testimony offered to show that any undue intimacy existed between Bourgeois and Mrs. Lacier was presented by Detective Bourgeois.

The testimony tends to show the presence of the defendant at the home of the co-respondent on several occasions, "recites the Chancellor, "but fact, he admits having been there, but claims his visits were strictly on business, he being counsel for Mrs. Lacier."

The Chancellor holds that Bourgeois' loss of affection for his wife was due to an insupportable disposition and jealousy on the part of the wife.

"There is testimony to prove the loss of affection by Bourgeois for his wife, he finds, "but that such a conclusion is established by fact. She asserts it and he admits it, and much depends on whether he deliberately withdrew it or whether her conduct compelled it. The testimony taken in all phases on an impression upon my mind that Mrs. Bourgeois is what is commonly known as an insanely jealous woman."

PLIGHT OF GERMANY FORECAST BY BISMARK

Prophetic Letter Just Revealed Was Written December 24, 1886

Berlin, April 3.—(By A. P.)—A prophetic bearing on Germany's present situation was made by Bismarck in a letter written to the Prussian Minister of War, General Bronsart von Schellendorf, and dated December 24, 1886. The historic document has just been made available to the Associated Press.

"If God wills that we shall be defeated in the next war, then there can be no doubt that our victorious opponents will halt at no expedient to prevent us from getting our feet again—at least not for a generation—just as they did in 1807," the Iron Chancellor wrote.

"He warned his Minister that Germany would be called upon to defend both her eastern and western borders in the 'next war,' as the new alignment of European Powers precluded the probability of Germany being able to count on Russian and English assistance, as was the case in 1813 when, in addition to the support of those nations, Germany found an unexpected ally in the Russian winter which destroyed Napoleon's army. The letter continued: "The present German Empire could not remain intact after a lost campaign, as witness the Reichstag election and partisan activities, which prove how readily patriotism is forgotten when party interests and out it is desirable to court favor abroad."

"A victorious France would find our opposition parties equally as servile as did Napoleon the Rhinish League in his day."
