General Farrar bids farewell in "Butterfly"

Geraldine Farrar, who has decided to devote her time for at least a year to the concert stage, made her last appearance in Philadelphia with the Metropolitan Opera Company last evening in an impressive performance of Madame Butterfly at the Academy of Music.

Miss Farrar has been in better voice than she was last evening, but she has never given a more sympathetic interpretation of the pathetic role of Butterfly, especially in the closing act, where her dramatic work was of the finest possible character.

Of the other members of the cast, the chief honors went to Mario Chamlee. It was his first appearance in this city as a member of the Metropolitan, and he showed that he has gained in beauty of voice and in dramatic expression since becoming a member of that famous organization.

Miss Forman, the traditional Suzuki to Miss Farrar's Butterfly, gave the best performance of the role that she has yet shown in this city. Her dramatic work in the second and third acts was very fine and she made the most of her one vocal opportunity—the duet in the second act.

Mr. Moranzoni's conducting was excellent and he was careful to keep the orchestra in its proper place in relation to the voices, setting them off to good advantage and lending the whole opera with full appreciation of its pathos and beauty.

Huester Made Scranton Alderman

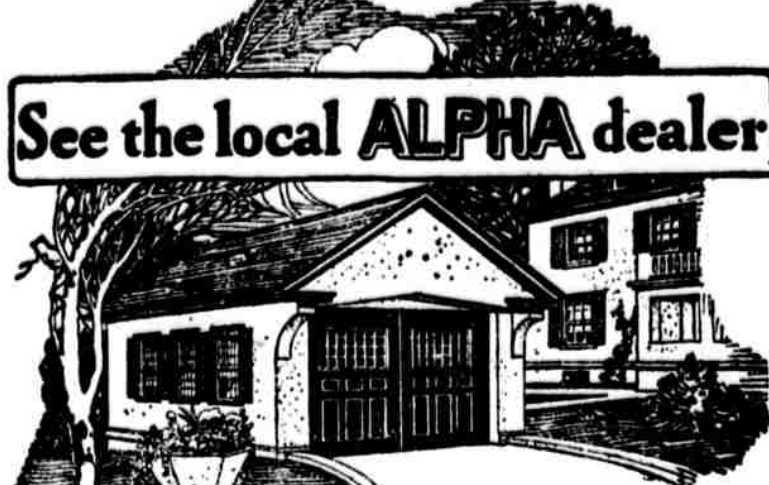
Scranton, April 5. — Fred J. Huester was yesterday appointed alderman of the Eleventh Ward to succeed Jacob F. Huester, deceased.

Garden Gossip : What to Plant and When

It's a little too early to plant fried tomatoes and corn-fritters, but it will do you no harm to know in advance how to do it.

To do well, sweet corn requires a rich soil or one heavily manured. It may be grown either in rows or hills. To have corn ripen in succession, plantings should be made once a week from the moment the ground is warm enough until about July 15, using the early varieties for the first three sowings, then the medium, then the late sorts, except that the last two plantings should be made with early varieties.

One quart of grains is required for 200 hills, one quart for a drill of a

hundred feet and eight quarts for an acre.

There are two methods of growing tomatoes in the garden. One is to allow them their own freedom by planting them four feet apart each way. The other way is to tie them to stakes and plant them in rows three feet apart and eighteen inches apart in the row. Don't plant tomatoes in too rich soil. It is important that all unnecessary foliage be removed, so the sun may strike the plants.

The egg plant is tender and cannot be planted outdoors until about May 1.

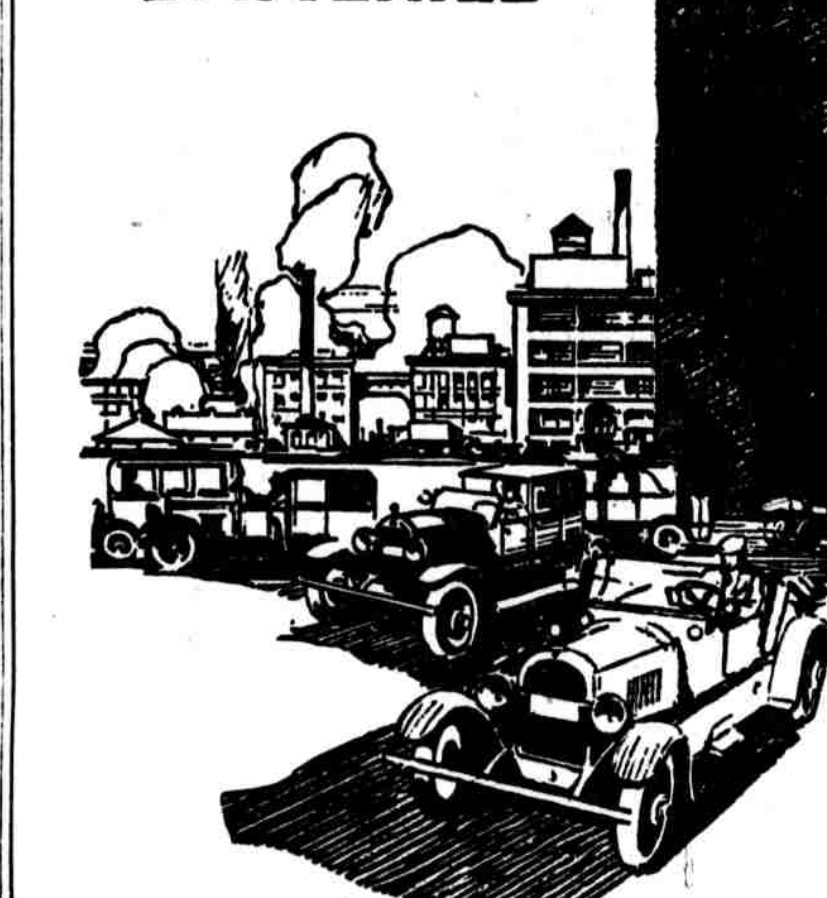
Women Lawyers to Hold Mock Court

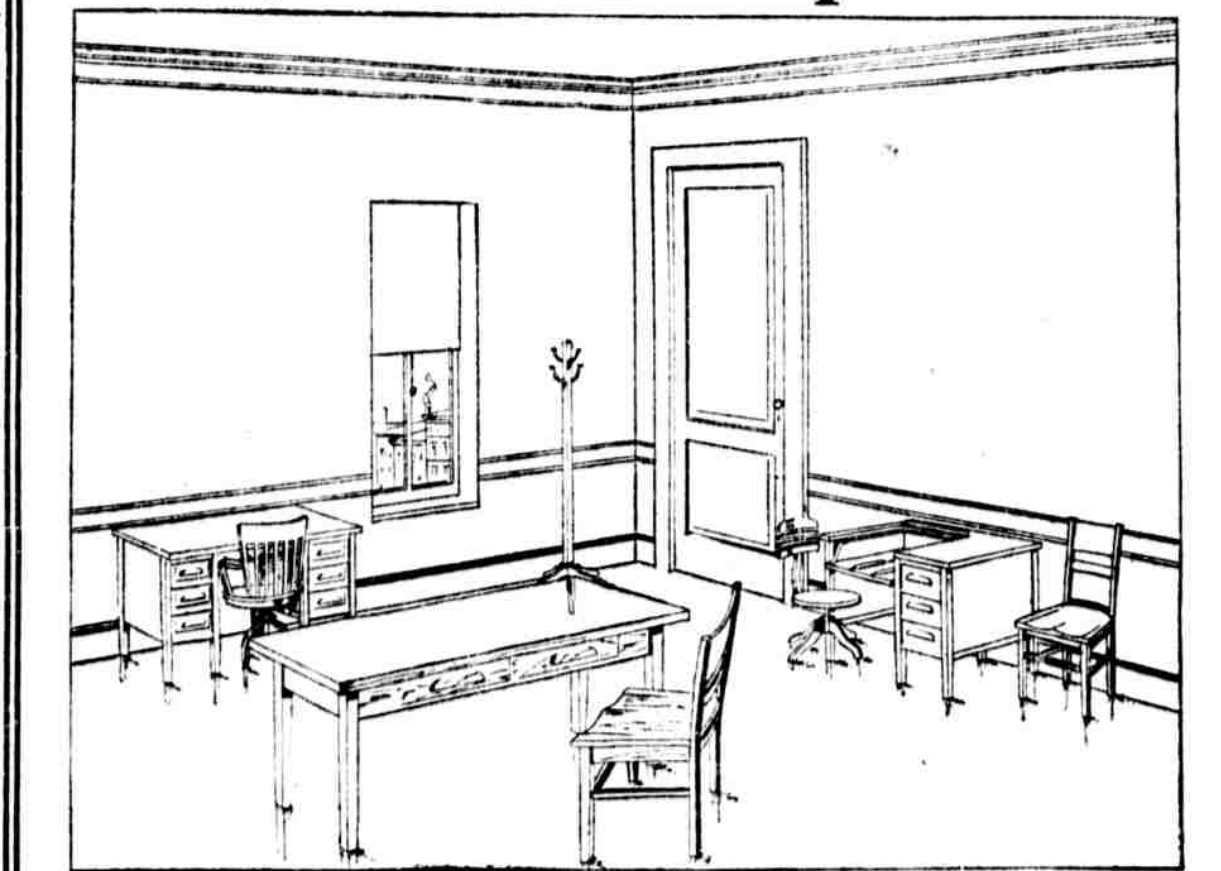
