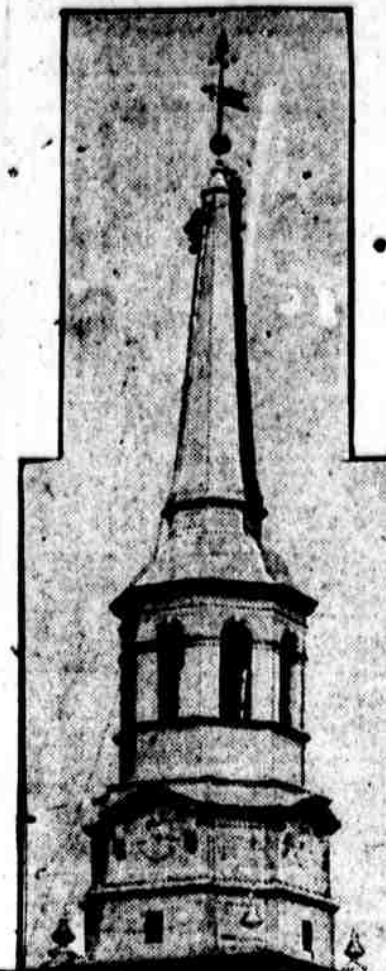




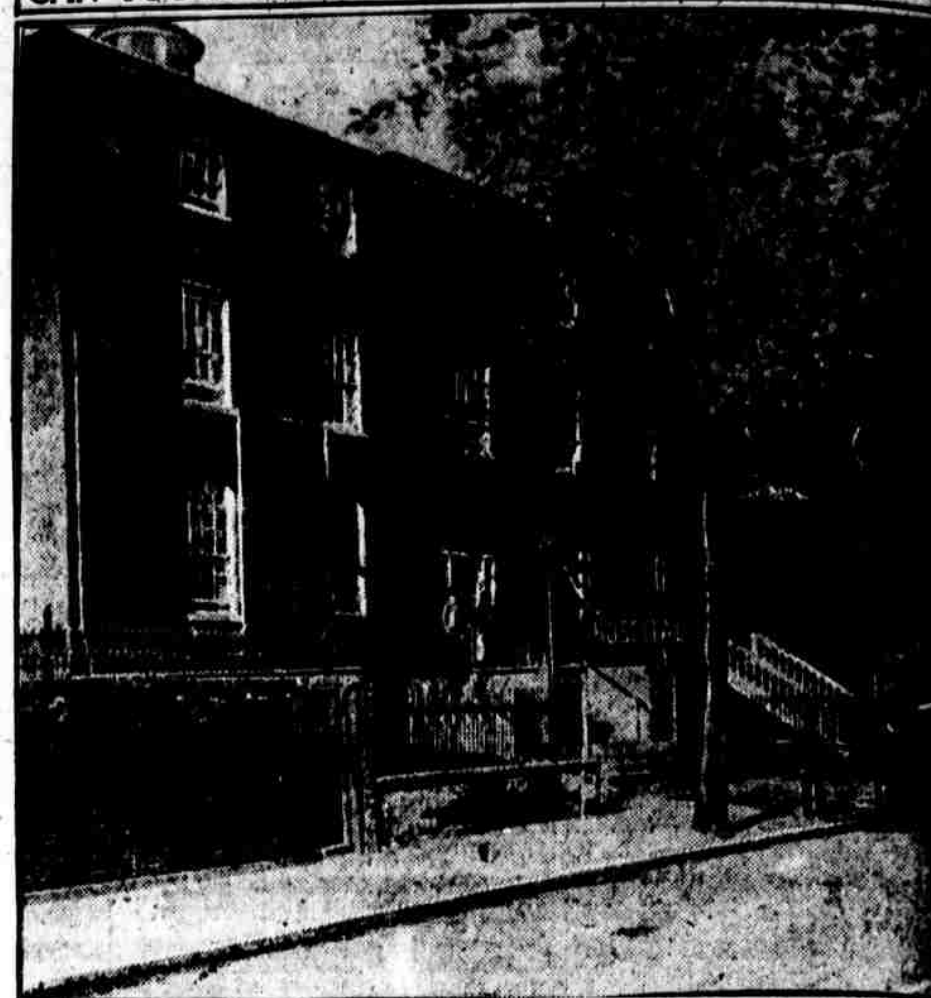
IN "ZERO." Miss Dorothy Spooner, surrounded by "ice and snow," will dance with other New York society girls in play given for charity.

CAN YOU RECALL THIS BIT OF OLD PHILADELPHIA?



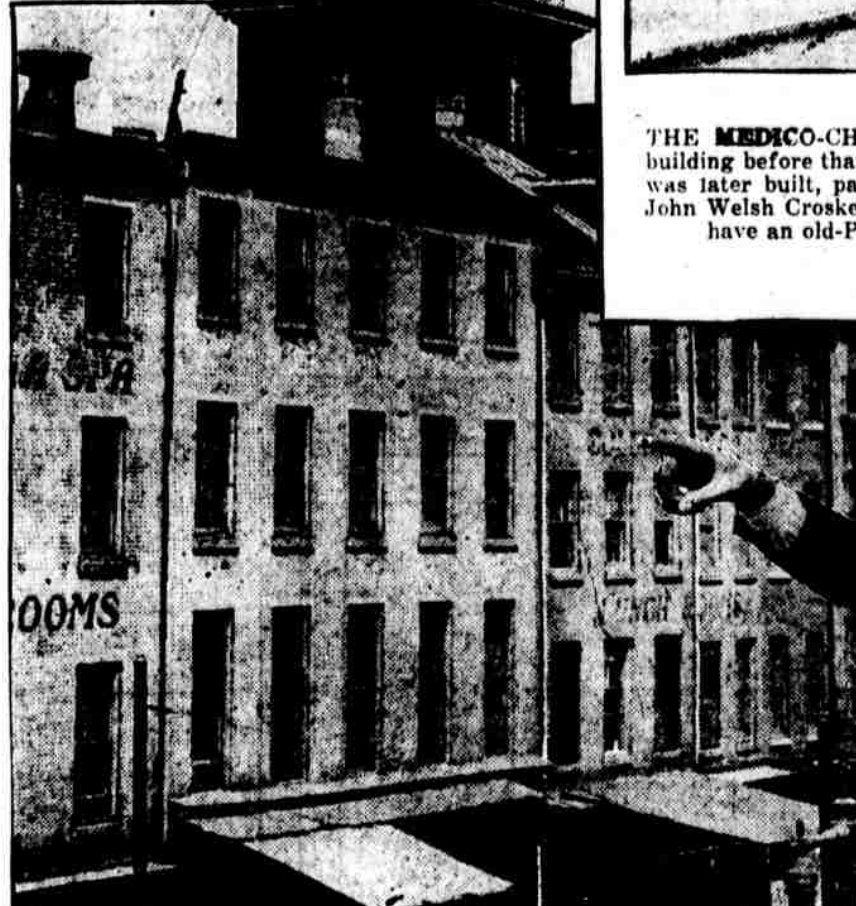

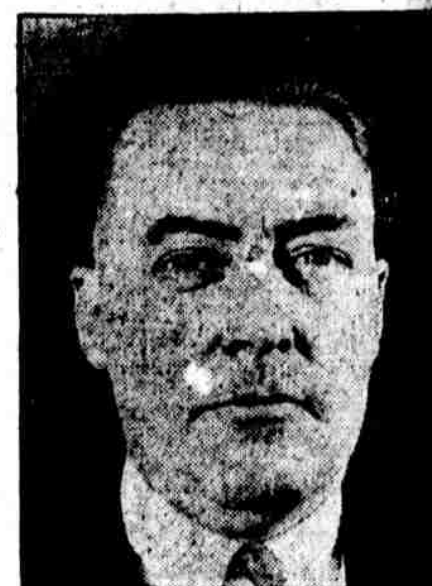

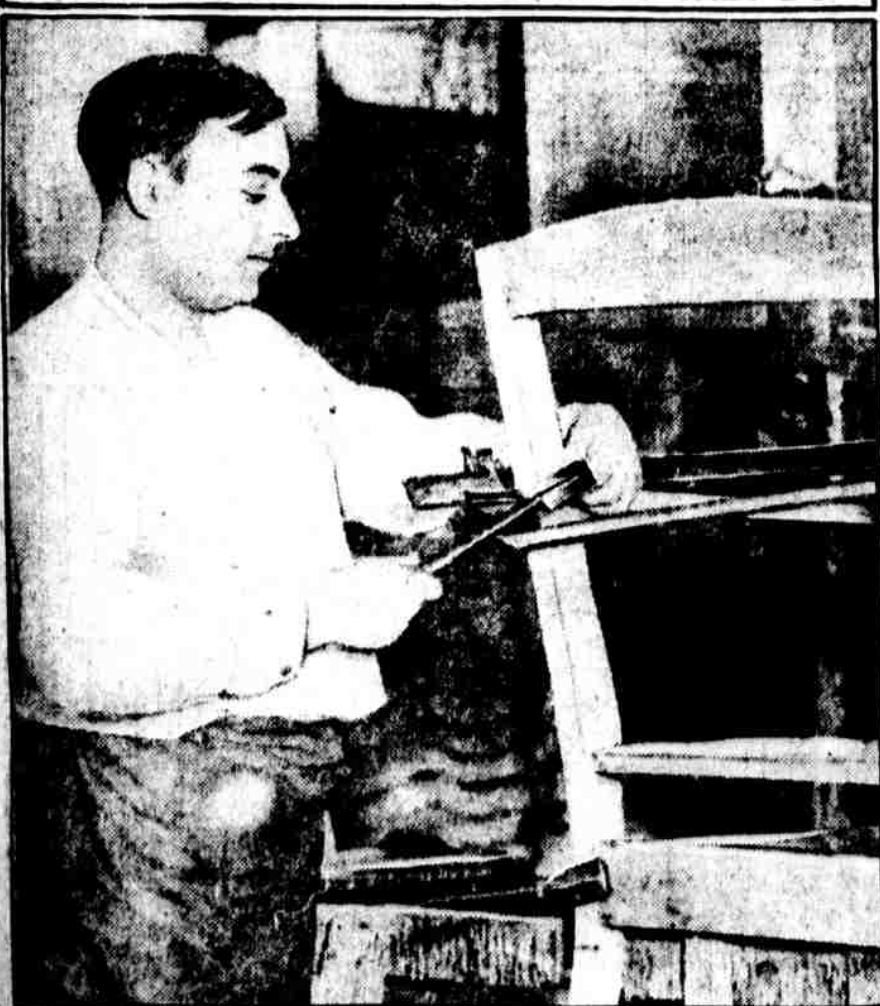

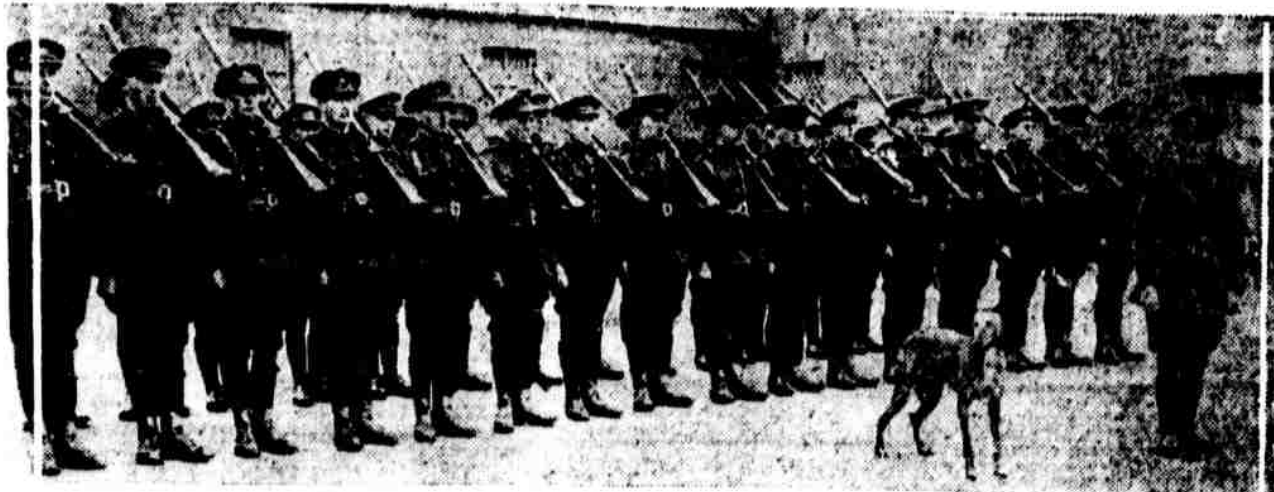

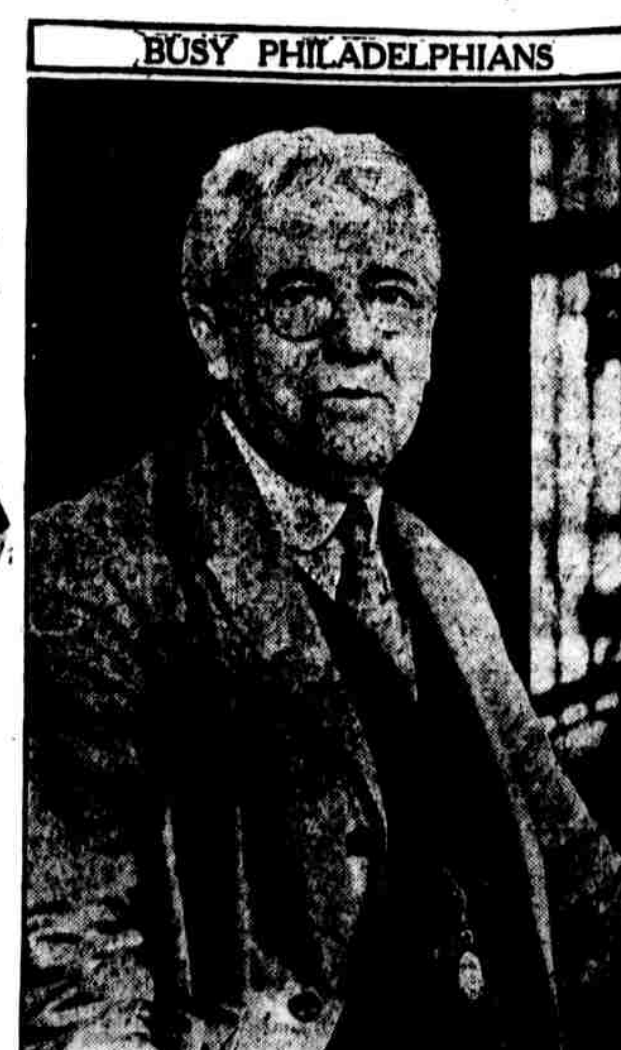
ON THE ULSTER FRONTIER. The army of the Irish Free State is holding itself in readiness to deal with emergencies. This group was snapped during drill hour.
