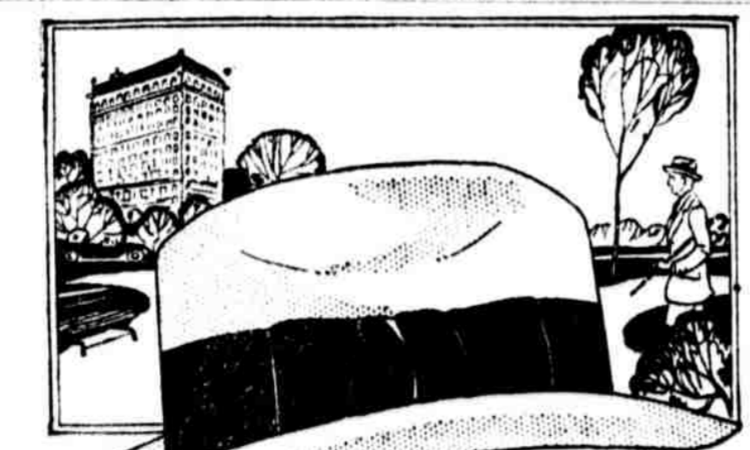
The P. R. T. field is now being completely overhauled and the seating capacity has been doubled and many other improvements will be made.
