If that department has difficulty in getting information from Christian Scientists at any time, the reason for it is likely to be found in the attitude shown on this occasion toward the physician of another school, who, when appearing before the health officers to give information, was at once confronted with the fact that he was going to be treated as a criminal, because he refused to administer antitoxin to the patient, although he had a perfect legal right to do so, and in the face of the fact that physicians of the same school frequently differ in their diagnoses of cases, and manner of treatment.

The claim that the Christian Science nurse in attendance refused to give medicine seems rather silly in view of the well-known fact that Christian Scientists hever give any material medicine, and she was not asked to do so. When material medicine is desired for the patient, a Christian Science practitioner will usually withdraw from the case, knowing that when faith is divided between spirit and matter, there is little hope of the patient geting the benefit of either, and therefore it is better to rely upon one form of treatbetter to rely upon one form of treat-ment at a time and give it full scope

in its healing purpose.

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
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
