SOTHERN AND MARLOWE PRESENT "TWELFTH NIGHT"

Shakespearean Stars Seen in Splendid Performance of Comedy Lyric-The well-known and attractive company of a comedy that has neither spite nor rancor to mar its smooth flow, is presenting the performance of "Twelfth Night" by E. H. Sothorn and Julia Marlowe and the splendid company with which they have surrounded themselves. Indeed, the all-around ability of the supporting cast, probably the best ever seen with these stars, made the performance last night a little more delightful, a little more warm with the vitality of real life, and a little more satisfying than ever before.

For instance, and with no intent to deprive the co-stars of any bit of their due, the playing of the varied roles of Sir Toby, Maria, Olivia, Sir Andrew Aguecheek, Fabian, the Clown and Duke Orsino, marked an ensemble of excellence that it would be hard to beat. Mr. Sothorn's Malvolio, in many ways the most clearly limned and lifelike of all his impersonations, has improved with repetition till there is no single opportunity that the star lets slide to sketch in the pompous traits of the most delightful steward.
