Last night they renewed ring relationship for the seventh time, and on this occasion, in the wind-up at the Lee Palace, the Mack battler finally succeeded in winning from Leonard—not only by a wide margin and decisively, but in two came pretty near adding "K. O. by" after the Philadelphia man's name.

Four times in the third session Mack scored knockdowns. Leonard was in bad shape—wobbly, dizzy and all but out. He took counts of eight, nine, nine and two. The fourth time referee Floyd practiced arithmetic both ways on the floor. Mack hit having stumbled over Leonard's body.

Again in the seventh round, Leonard was buffeted around pretty hard and often—rocked and dazed. Leonard was in a number of blows that might have landed with knockdown power.

Leonard is Game In defeat Leonard proved himself a game guy. At no time did this lad flinch and he always fought back hard. After being floored so often in the third period and punched around fairly hard in the fourth, Leonard came back with a great burst of speed in the fifth and sixth rounds, outboxing and out-punching the rugged Canadian.

Mack's victory and near-knockout was even more impressive when it is considered that he stepped in as an emergency batter. Leonard originally had been matched to meet Johnny Buff, the champion. Buff reported several days ago with his throat severely swollen and Pete Herman, former title-holder, was substituted.

When Herman stepped on the scales last night at the Palace he weighed 125 pounds, six more than Leonard. Leonard refused to meet Pete. So it was necessary to get another substitute, and Battling Mack, 120 pounds, came forward. Overnight Mack has earned for himself a reputation good enough to stand out today as a worthy opponent for the best of the bantams.
