Receiver Seeks \$500,000 From Thirteen New York Brokerage Firms

REOPEN STONEHAM DEAL

A dividend of from thirty to thirty. five cents on the dollar mar now be expected by creditors of the defunct brokerage firm of E. D. Dier & Co., according to the receiver.

Furthermore, an additional \$500,000 for creditors will be demanded this for creditors will be demanded this week of thirteen New York brokerage houses. It is declared these firms accepted commissions from the Dier firm, knowing it to be a bucket shop, and without performing any real service for these commissions. Saul S. Myers, of New York, counsel for the receiver, said today one firm alone got \$300,000 of this money.

Suit to recover commissions in such cases is said to be something new. The

The dicovery of the extent to which the Dier assets were swept away in such Dier assets were swept away in such commissions has only recently come to light through an intensive study of the Dier accounts, according to Mr. Myers. More than \$3,000,000 belonging to customers was mysteriously dissipated and many brokerage houses of repute, he says, are among the beneficiaries.

At the last meeting of creditors it was announced that from the wreckage of the Dier concern it seemed possible to collect about \$000,000. The chance of recovering damages from several wealthy firms which had transactions with the Dier company, knowing it to be

wealthy firms which had transactions with the Dier company, knowing is to be a bucket shop, made it likely that several hundred thousand dollars additional will be recovered, Mr. Myers said, so that net assets of \$1,250,000 or more may be found to offset liabilities of more than \$3,000,000. About twenty-five cents on the dollar was in sight for creditors at the last announcement. This new development, according to Mr. Myers, makes possible a dividend of thirty to thirty-

possible a dividend of thirty to thirtyfive cents on the dollar.

W. Blumenthal, attorneys, of 233
Broadway, attacked the action of the
receiver for Dier & Co., in agreeing to
accept \$200.000 in settlement of all posaccept \$200,000 in settlement of all pos-sible claims against Charles A. Stoneham, part owner of the Giants, and made known his intention of insisting upon a searching public inquiry into Mr. Stoneham's conections with the

"It is absolutely imperative that a complete investigation be made by our committee and its counsel. Mr. Blumenthal said, "respecting the following important elements in this bank-ruptcy affair with the end in view of recovering for the creditors the money

due them:
"First. The real cause which brought about the expulsion of Colonel Harry D. Hughes from the Philadelphia Exchange at the time he was a member of the firm of Hughes & Dier., and what relation, if any, he had to the precipitation of Dier & Co. into bank-

"Second. The pecuniary interests, if any, of 'Doc' Dier and his associates and Charles A. Stoneham and his associates in the little business transaction involving \$5,300,000 whereby Charles A. Stoneham & Co. transferred its customers' accounts to Hughes &

"Third. The pecuniary interest, if any that Charles A. Stoneham and his associates and 'Doe' Dier and his associates had in the purchase on the part Charles A. Stoneham from E. D. Der & Co. of some \$2,400,000 worth


