WU FORGES GAIN  
CONTROL OF PEKIN

Liberalist Enters After Com-  
pletely Routing Army Under  
General Chang

WAR OVER, LEGATION VIEW

By the Associated Press  
Pekin, May 5.—General Wu Pei-Fu  
was in control of Peking at noon today,  
and General Chang Tso-Lin, whose  
forces he routed yesterday, was re-  
ported fleeing to Mukden. Chang's  
army is retreating in disorder toward  
Tientsin.

Observers here believe Chang's sud-  
den collapse has ended the hostilities.  
All fighting in the vicinity of Peking  
had ceased this morning, but the city  
remained isolated so far as railroad  
communication was concerned.

General Wu Pei-Fu early today was  
reported within a few hours' travel of  
Peking, but he had not then decided  
whether to enter the capital, appar-  
ently awaiting the result of the fighting  
in the direction of Tientsin. He was  
contented until he had either captured  
Chang Tso-Lin or driven him to Muk-  
den. This was taken to indicate that  
he was not concerned about entering  
Peking immediately, although nothing  
prevented his doing so.

After Chang Tso-Lin's defeat in the  
Pengtai and Changsien districts  
Thursday, he took up a position along  
the Peking-Tientsin Railroad between  
the stations of Langfang and Lofa. His  
purpose apparently was to rally his  
forces scattered in the vicinity of Peking  
and prevent Wu Pei-Fu's advance upon  
Tientsin.

The gates of Peking remained closed  
overnight. The section of Peking inside  
the walls, occupied by the Americans,  
became greatly excited during the night  
by an attempt of the soldiers to gain  
entrance.

The soldiers tried to ram the gate.  
The guards on top of the wall dis-  
persed the attacking troops with ma-  
chine guns. No foreigners were in-  
jured.

Admiral Strauss, commander of the  
American Asiatic fleet, left in an au-  
tomobile this morning for Tientsin. As  
the car was expected to cross the lines  
it flew a white flag.

P. R. R. OFFICIAL DENOUNCES  
FEDERAL OWNERSHIP MOVE

Lee Welcomes Competition of Motor-  
trucks and Airplanes

New York, May 5.—Denunciation of  
the movement for government ownership  
of railroads, which he predicted would  
fail, featured an address here today by  
Elisha Lee, vice president of the East-  
ern region of the Pennsylvania Rail-  
road system, before members of the  
Transportation Club of New York. Mr.  
Lee charged that outside of socialist  
the advocates of government own-  
ership are nearly all actuated by selfish  
motives.

Peering into the future of transporta-  
tion, he said:  
"The future of the railroads will be  
more and more in the wholesale de-  
partments of transportation, while  
motor vehicles may be expected to be-  
come a more important factor in the  
retail trade, with the airplane a potent  
factor as a possible competitor for the  
highest class of passenger service."

"As these developments in general  
will tend to relieve the railroads of  
unprofitable forms of service and per-  
mit them to concentrate more on the  
forms which they are best adapted to  
handle efficiently, the net result should  
be regarded as beneficial and as quite  
possibly tending to simplify the solu-  
tion of the financial problems involved  
in providing for future railroad ex-  
pansion."

RICHARD CROKER BURIED  
IN GLENCAIRN MAUSOLEUM

Many Friends Present at Funeral  
of Former Tammany Chief

Dublin, May 5.—(By A. P.)—Rich-  
ard Croker, former Tammany chieftain,  
who died last Saturday, was buried to-  
day in the mausoleum on the grounds  
of Glencairn Castle, the beautiful es-  
tate on his native soil of Ireland, where  
he had spent his declining years.

Mass was previously celebrated in the  
oratory of the castle by Father Kelly,  
the parish priest, absolution being given  
by Bishop Miller, who officiated owing  
to the friendly absence of Arch-  
bishop Byrne.

Although it had been announced the  
funeral would be private, there was  
nevertheless a considerable assemblage  
present, including many friends made  
by the late Tammany leader in his long  
association with the turf.

The pallbearers included Arthur Geif-  
fith, president of the Dail Eireann, and  
Admiral McDonagh, one of the lead-  
ing members of Eamon de Valera's  
party. The Lord Mayor of Dublin  
walked with Mrs. Croker.

PLAN MIXED COMMISSION  
ON LUSITANIA DAMAGES

Negotiations Between United States  
and Germany Under Way

Washington, May 5.—(By A. P.)—  
Negotiations are under way between  
the United States and Germany, it  
was said in official circles today, looking  
to the organization of the Mixed Claims  
Commission, which will pass upon  
claims growing out of the seizure of  
property in the United States and Ger-  
many, and upon claims by American  
citizens as a result of sinking of the  
Lusitania.

The commission probably will consist  
of three members—one American, one  
German and a neutral. Completion of  
treaty providing for the commission  
will be followed by reference of the  
document to the Senate for approval,  
and by passage of enabling legislation.  
It was not expected that the treaty  
would be sent to the Senate during the  
present session, however.

McRAE MAJOR GENERAL

Commander of 78th Fills Vacancy  
Caused by McAndrew's Death

Washington, May 5.—(By A. P.)—  
Selection of Brigadier General James  
H. McRae, first assistant chief of staff,  
to be a major general to fill the vacancy  
caused by the death of Major General  
James W. McAndrew, was announced  
by Secretary Weeks.

Promotion of Colonel Harry A.  
Smith, infantry, to the grade of brig-  
adier general also was announced.  
General McRae commanded the Sev-  
enty-eighth Division during its train-  
ing at Camp Dix and also in France.  
He has been in charge of the personnel  
division of the general staff.
