BERKS

Reading, Pa., May 17. Berks gave Gifford Pinchot a majority of about 2500, according to returns calculated this morning. The vote was one of the lightest on record in some precincts, less than a tenth of the registered vote.

LANCASTER

Lancaster, Pa., May 17.—Gifford Pinchot will carry Lancaster County by about 11,000, according to the Lancaster County Committee headquarters.

LEHIGH

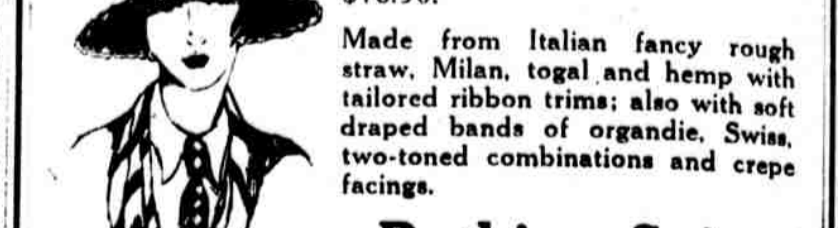
Allentown, Pa., May 17. Lehigh County went four to one for Pinchot. Eighty-six out of the eighty-seven districts in the county, one, Weisenborn, being missing up to noon, gave Pinchot 4904 and Alter 1329. Only one-third of the vote was polled, mostly due to the miserable daylight-saving regulations in practice here.

LYCOMING

Williamsport, Pa., May 17. With complete unofficial reports from only half of the eighty-four districts of Lycoming County, including all Williamsport districts, Pinchot has 3412 votes and Alter 1329. Pinchot's majority in the county is estimated at 2083.

Pinchot Winner, Baker Concedes

Continued from Page One. Pinchot, of Lockswanna County, and Secretary of Interior, James P. Woodward, of Allegheny County.

Senator Pepper won by a substantial majority over Berks to the unexpected term of the late Senator Pennington. Senator Pepper's Democratic opponent at the November election will be Judge Samuel E. Hull, of Monroe County, who was impossible for the nomination.

With about 50 per cent of all the State divisions missing, Pepper's vote is 125,518, while Berks polled 224,214. Philadelphia gave Pepper 219,709 and Berks 79,774.

David A. Reed, of Pittsburgh, who was unsuccessful for the Republican nomination for Governor, and for the full term beginning next March, will be opposed by Paul B. Keen, of Clearfield, nominated by the Democrats for both positions, in a contest expected to be a close one.

John A. McSparran, master of the State Grange, will be the Democratic opponent of the winner of the Alter-Pinchot race. McSparran was nominated without opposition.

The wards carried by Pinchot in Philadelphia were the Eighth, Twentieth, Twentieth, Twenty-second, Twenty-third, Twenty-fourth, Twenty-fifth, Twenty-sixth, Twenty-seventh, Twenty-eighth, Twenty-ninth, Thirtieth, Thirty-first, Thirty-second and Forty-sixth.

Devlin Got in Bandwagon. An analysis of the returns showed that seven of the Pinchot wards had been carried by Mayor Moore in the memorable primary of 1919, and the outpouring of independent votes was somewhat on par with yesterday's tally.

Another Vice President who could not hold his ward for the third time, and who had been elected in 1919, was State Senator Albert W. Taylor, of York, who polled 2672 in the Twenty-seventh Ward and Alter 2622.

One District Sold. North Wales, home of R. R. Frenz, deputy to County Chairman, Frenz, State Senator, and member of the United States and Allegheny county boards.

In the First District of Upper Merion Township, Pinchot received all the votes polled, 77, a record that would have been broken by Pinchot had he been elected. The Democratic women did not vote in any district.

Frank P. Cook, an assistant for the Republican gubernatorial nomination, was not elected. King of Prussia, in Upper Merion, where he lives, is expected a complimentary vote of 25, the township going strongly for Pinchot.
