The first legal action was taken by Miss Acker. She filed a suit for separate maintenance, alleging Valentine had not supported her. She asserted that when she married him he had not being; that partly through her efforts he gained fame as an actor and that then

he failed to support her.

On a cross-complaint, Valentine asked for a divorce, declaring Miss Acker had deserted him. On the witness stand he detailed alleged attempt to persuade her to return to him and made the declaration. After-Dinner Tricks



164-An Instantaneous Knot A bandkerchief is held by corners diagonally opposite, between the fingers of each hand. The hands are merely

brought together and drawn apart quite rapidly. A knot has appeared in the center of the clote. The trick depends upon a shift of fingers, executed when the hands come together. Hold the handkerchief exnetly as shown in the first figure, each corner between the first and second fincorner between the first and second fingers. As the bands come together, the left hand is turned back up, while the right thumb comes up under the hand-kerchief. (Fig. 2.) As the handsmeet, the left end of the handkerchief is clipped between the thumb and second finger of the right hand, and the right end is similarly taken by the left hand. The forefingers are raised, releasing the original hold, and the hands are simply drawn apart. The knot is tied automatically.
