MANUFACTURERS' NOT TO DISBAND LEAGUE

Eleventh Season Will Be Started Next Week; Several Applications Are Pending

SOME TWILIGHT GAMES

PHILADELPHIA—Manufacturers' Baseball League, oldest organization of its kind, will be in the field again. For several weeks it was thought the industrial world disbanded due to the inability of the teams to secure playing fields, but the difficulty has been overcome.

Secretary James Hunter, who has acted in that capacity since the league first saw the light of day some ten years ago, has solved the problem. The teams that are unable to play on Saturdays, will all their playing dates with twilight engagements, and the season will get under way either next Thursday or Saturday.

Red Men Start Tomorrow

The Red Men's Baseball League will usher in the 1922 season tomorrow afternoon. Two sections will be playing ball when things get going, but tomorrow only Section A will be seen in action.

It is expected that it will be several weeks before the teams in the B Division get under way and final details are far from complete. Plans have been formulated for playing the schedule in two halves, the winner of the first series to clash with the titleholder in the second half. After the champions of their respective divisions have been decided a series for the championship of the entire Order of Red Men will be in order.

The schedule committee has not as yet drafted the playing dates for other series, but the games in a League tomorrow are:

Section A, 21, vs. Yonah, at Thirty-fifth and Passyunk; Muskoka, 25, vs. Minnewa, 79, at Haines and Sullivan streets; Unwey, 29, vs. Herriam, 6, at Twenty-ninth and Locust; Greenway, 20, at Fifty-eighth and Greenway, and Yuba, 27, vs. Schuylkill Tribe, 29, at Twenty-ninth and Somerset streets.

The announcement made yesterday that Bill Barrett had been signed by the Fleisher club, should put the downtowners very much in the running for the championship of the Philadelphia Baseball Association.

When Tom Walker started the season he had Bill McKenty and Bill Griess-huber and several others. Things looked rosy, but the weather for one thing has been against his team and they also have met with injuries. The Yarners, as a result, have not won with the consistency expected, but the acquisition of Barrett makes them appear one of the strongest of the local teams.

Boxers' Nine Formed
The All-Philadelphia boxers' baseball team has been organized and games are to be booked with leading clubs in this vicinity. Frankie Williams, South Philadelphia weaver, who also has had lots of experience in handling baseball teams, is getting together some good ballplayers among the local team, and he is confident that a fast article of the national pastime will be put on by the glove wielders.

Low Tandler, local star light-weighter, a crack ballplayer, and so are Hobbs Barrett, Al Stone, Earl Herriam, Frankie Conway, Charles Ray, Tommy Loughran, Jimmy Jordan, Al Wagner, Steve Morris and several others. Williams is to get these boys together and give them different berths on the nine. Al Wagner has been elected president of the Boxers' Baseball Club; Steve Morris, secretary; Frankie Williams, manager; Vic Brown, captain, and Rube Smith, treasurer. H. C. Fox has been appointed manager and has signed a number of star players including McCarthy, catcher; Finerty and Noe, pitchers; Travis,

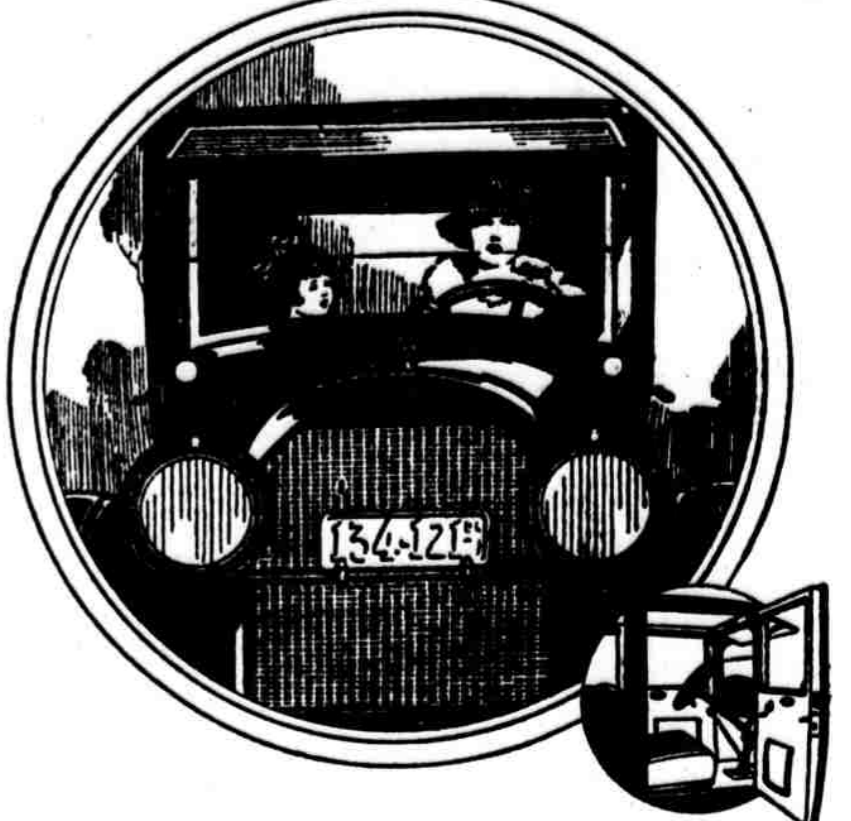
