**LEGION POSTS PLAN FOR MEMORIAL DAY**

Members of Shetzline Unit Will Plant Tree for Dead of Thirty-ninth Ward

SERVICES AT CHURCHES

Most other Legion activities have given way for the time to the general preparations for Memorial Day. In the programs that have been announced from time to time for various sections of the city slight changes and additions have in some cases been made.

William T. Shetzline Post, No. 96, will meet at Sixth and Ritner streets and will march to the League Island Boulevard. There the veterans will plant a tree to be dedicated to the soldier dead of the Thirty-ninth Ward. In the afternoon they will join the nurses' post at services in the Trinity Lutheran Church. Following this there will be another parade.

The Parkers will have some of their members by a number of posts, among them Harry Ingersoll Post, No. 174, and Furman-Bennet Post, No. 188. After these services the post will march to Holy Cross and Mount Carmel Churches.

Frank G. Girard Post, No. 271, of Harborside, will join the local G. A. R. in the observance of Memorial Day. The program includes exercises by Boy Scouts and school children.

It is hoped that the memorial tablet to the men of Harborside who went to the war will be finished in time for unveiling.

George H. Duloff Post, No. 153, will join several others in the parade down Broad street from Susquehanna avenue. Previously there will have been services in the Bethlehem Baptist Church, at which Lieutenant Jean Labadie, of the French Embassy, will present the "Commemorative Medals" to war mothers in this district.

Toga Post will assemble at 9 o'clock at Broad and Erie avenues, and will take part in the parade of the North Philadelphia organizations. Afterward it will proceed to Westminster cemetery, where it will hold its own services at the graveside.

The afternoon of Memorial Day, however, Toga Post will go to a picnic in Harborside Park. There will be a baseball game between single and married members.

**FORMER HOSPITAL PATIENT ADOPTS IT AS HIS HOME**

John Rowbottom Got Well, but Decided to Stay There

Patients, doctors, nurses and even residents come and go from the Samaritan Hospital, but a permanent fixture of that institution is John Rowbottom, custodian of hospital records.

John was taken to the hospital twenty years ago suffering an abscess of a lung. After some thirteen or fourteen operations he was allowed to call himself a healthy man. Even so he only moved his bed from the ward to the employees' quarters.

His own almost interminable recovery had led him to an unshakable faith in the efficiency of the hospital. It is a part of him that when some one reproaches him for an ambulance for a man who had lost three fingers in an accident, John replied, "Gather up the flippers and send them along with the man."

He is one of the leaders of the hospital's campaign for \$250,000.
